WELCOME TO SOUTH AUSTRALIA and the Edinburgh Defence Precinct.

In my second year as the Senior Australian Defence Force Officer for the Edinburgh Defence Precinct (EDP), I am honoured to support the 6,500 Defence members, Defence civilians, Defence contractors, and their families who call the EDP and South Australia home. In this tense global environment, I am also focused on ensuring that the EDP continues to support the joint force intelligence, surveillance,

reconnaissance, electronic warfare, combat teams, joint integrated air and missile defence, and multi-domain fires formation systems that raise, train, sustain and project from the EDP.

The EDP, located 27 km north of Adelaide's CBD, comprises:

- RAAF Edinburgh: As one of two super bases in Australia, Edinburgh hosts over 50 Defence units and elements, boasting exceptional people and assets.
- Defence Science Technology Group: Tasked with working closely with Australia's science, technology and innovation ecosystem, they deliver scientific advice and solutions, enhancing Defence and national security capabilities.
- Edinburgh Parks: comprises various Defence garrison support elements.
- Woomera Range Complex (WRC): Situated an additional 500km north, WRC is the world's largest land-based test environment, covering 120,000km² of South Australia's outback.

Facilities uplift at the precinct continues in order to support the leading-edge capabilities that call the EDP home. While infrastructure to sustain the P-8A Poseidon maritime patrol aircraft, MC-55A electronic warfare aircraft and MQ-4C unmanned platform operations are now mature, major construction projects will continue well into the next decade. These projects include facilities to support weapons systems including the High Mobility Artillery Rocket Systems and

National Advanced Surface-to-Air Missile System capabilities are in progress. A new \$160 million facility will allow for the heavy maintenance and modification of the ADF heavy aircraft fleet, and a new multi-user depot for cadets and Reservists are progressing well; the future is exciting.

In 2024, we prioritised well-being through various EDN Welfare initiatives, including an open day, a family day and a monster raffle. These activities, along with Mess revitalisation, will continue to ensure you are rewarded for your service and family sacrifice.

I look forward to continuing a strong relationship with the 'locals' by engaging with our local partners, community groups, Defence service agencies and Veteran support groups. I encourage you to do the same, with a range of opportunities presented in this publication. Participation in these opportunities will not only be rewarding, but an excellent way to meet new friends and establish a mutual community support network.

Have a great 2025, look after yourself, your families and your workmates. 

With four sites and more than 6,000 personnel, Edinburgh Defence Precinct is South Australia's largest Defence establishment, and continues to develop.

HE EDINBURGH DEFENCE **PRECINCT,** approximately 27km north of the Adelaide Central Business District, is the largest Defence establishment in South Australia in terms of geographical area, number

The precinct comprises four sites:

of staff and number of units.

RAAF Edinburgh. Located on the western side of West Avenue, RAAF Edinburgh comprises the RAAF Base, the precinct's operational elements including Air Force and Army units, logistics and maintenance supports units, garrison support elements (messes, accommodation, gym, pool) and a commercial area comprising cafes, banks, post office, community centre and barber.

Defence Science & Technology Group-

Edinburgh (DST-E). Located on the eastern side of West Ave, the DST-E site comprises Defence Science & Technology Group elements, two Air Force units and other Defence elements.

Edinburgh Parks. Located 2km south of RAAF Edinburgh, the Edinburgh Parks site comprises various Defence garrison support elements.

Woomera Range Complex. Located approximately 500km north of Adelaide, the Woomera Range Complex comprises RAAF Woomera, the Woomera Village and the Woomera Test Range. The Woomera Test Range is the world's largest land-based test range covering over 120,000 sq km.

The three sites of RAAF Edinburgh, DST-E and Edinburgh are located between Elizabeth and Salisbury in the northern suburbs of Adelaide. More than 6,500 staff, including notably RAAF,

Army, Defence civilians and contractors, work across the four sites giving the precinct a very joint feel.

There are over 65 residential units located on Edinburgh Defence Precinct. These units are drawn from most of the Defence Groups and Services including in particular Air Force, Army, Security and Estate Group, Joint Capabilities Group, Capability Acquisition and Support Group, Defence People Group, Defence Science and Technology and Chief Information Officer Group.

HISTORY

The Edinburgh Defence Precinct is located on land that was opened up for farming in the mid 19th Century. A small village called Penfield, originally located to the south of the current

RAAF Base and DSTG sites, served the farms. The Defence presence at Edinburgh dates back to World War II when, in 1940, the area on which Edinburgh Defence Precinct is now situated was acquired by the Commonwealth Government to build a munitions factory. A munitions plant, the largest in the southern hemisphere, was established in 1942 producing a wide variety of ammunition including shells, rockets, mines and torpedoes.

At the end of World War II, most of the site was closed down, with the exception of the TNT manufacturing plant (south of today's RAAF Base) which continued production until the mid 1960s.

From 1946 to the mid 1960s, the Australian



and British governments conducted joint weapons testing and maintained a long-range experimental firing range at Woomera. During testing, there were more than 2,000 British servicemen based at Edinburgh, Woomera and Maralinga. While the former Penfield weapons facility housed the administration infrastructure, stores, laboratories and most of the Australian based UK contractors, RAAF Edinburgh Field (as it was called in those days) was the logistics hub and accommodated a wide variety of Royal Air Force personnel. Meanwhile, RAAF Mallala, located about 60km north of Adelaide and built during World War II, supported the operations.

The significant support required to sustain the weapons testing was more than what RAAF Mallala and the small Edinburgh Airfield could provide prompting the development of a new RAAF base. Construction work began in 1953 and the new RAAF Base Edinburgh was formally opened by His Royal Highness Prince Philip. Duke of Edinburgh on 22 March 1954. While the new base was named after him, the base was, at one stage, going to be called Mirrabooka, until it was realised the aboriginal translation was 'stinking swamp'.

The base adopted a very multi-national feel, supporting a large number of British and Australian personnel as well as RAF and RAAF aircraft of diverse types involved in the weapons trials, including rockets and missiles at Woomera and atomic bomb testing at Maralinga.

In the mid 1960s, the British withdrew their weapons trials from South Australia and thus their presence from RAAF Edinburgh. Following their departure, Edinburgh was virtually vacant until the RAAF began relocating units to the base.

In May 1968, the first three P-3B Orion aircraft arrived at RAAF Edinburgh with No.11 Squadron completing its move to Edinburgh from RAAF Richmond in June 1968. The base underwent major development in the late 1970s following the decision for it to become the primary base for the RAAF's maritime capability. This followed a decision in 1975 to establish a Maritime Patrol Wing (92 Wing) comprising the already located 11 Squadron and moving 10 Squadron with the new P-3C aircraft from Townsville to Edinburgh. New facilities were built from 1978 to 1981 – many of which have only been replaced by the AIR 7000 redevelopment in recent years.

Since the 1970s, the number of units and Defence organisations at Edinburgh Defence Precinct has steadily increased. From about 2010, Army elements began relocating to RAAF Edinburgh, beginning with the reformation of 7th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (7RAR). The increased Army presence continued with the transfer of 1 Armoured Regiment in 2017.



EDP TODAY

The Edinburgh Defence Precinct has become an increasingly operationally focused Defence and joint Defence establishment. Over the past 10 years, it has become a major intelligence surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR) hub for the ADF with Air Warfare Centre, 92 Wing, and 1 Remote Sensing Unit residing on the base. Likewise, it has a very strong electronic warfare (EW) presence with Joint Electronic Warfare Operational Support Unit and 462 Squadron. The ISR and EW focus is reinforced by DST elements that provide vital research in these areas.

A large Army presence through operational units like 7RAR and 1 Armd Regt and the RAAF's No.24 Squadron significantly enhance the operational focus of RAAF Edinburgh. The Army presence is South Australia is currently being reconfigured, under national government

direction. 7RAR and 1ARMD are forecast to leave EDN in 2025-26, to be repositioned in the north of Australia and 10BDE is planned to move into Edinburgh in 2025-26. We say a fond farewell to the departing units and a warm welcome to 10BDE

Meanwhile, the logistics and garrison support infrastructure at RAAF Edinburgh is important to mounting and supporting operations and exercises in South Australia, particularly in the Cultana Exercise Area, located west of Port Augusta, and the Woomera Range Complex.

EDINBURGH REDEVELOPMENT

The facilities and infrastructure at Edinburgh have undergone a major transformation in recent years. It may be difficult to imagine as you drive through the base, but not so long ago the main thoroughfare was a narrow road bounded by drab 1950s-era buildings on one side and vacant fields on the other. Today, McNamara Drive is

a boulevard flanked on both sides by modern structures. Its transformation reflects the many changes that have occurred across the base to support Defence personnel and their families, and various new Air Force and Army units and major capabilities. Major garrison support facilities including combined messing, accommodation areas, gym and indoor pool, community commercial area and training areas were constructed from 2009-2010, as were facilities for Army and joint units relocated to RAAF Edinburgh.

In recent years, construction of new facilities for the P-8A Poseidon maritime patrol aircraft were completed. However, major construction projects will continue well into the late 2020s to support planned Army and Air Force capabilities including new aircraft and land combat elements. The exciting large-scale transformation that has taken place at Edinburgh over the past 10 years is set to continue.



RAAF UNITS



AIR WARFARE **CENTRE**

Established in January 2016 around the Aerospace Operational Support group, as a key priority of Plan Jericho, the Air Warfare Centre (AWC) is the Air Force's newest Force Element Group. The AWC was

established to ready the warfighter for complex air warfare in a fifth-generation context. It is designed to drive innovation and integration across Air Command. The AWC comprises a Headquarters AWC, responsible for the coordination and implementation of common and integrated functions across the AWC, and specific capability focused directorates providing electronic warfare, intelligence, test and evaluation, Air Force Ranges management and advanced air warfare tactics and training (located at RAAF Williamtown)

ADVANCED TEST AND TRAINING ENVIRONMENTS

The Advanced Test and Training Environments is the primary provider of Air Force Air Weapon Ranges and live, virtual and constructive (LVC) simulation to enable the testing of war materiel and the training of Air Force capabilities to deliver more effective warfighters. Its functions include range management, support to T&E, support of basic to advanced AW Training, and management of LVC capabilities and simulation. It conducts activities on the Woomera Test range.

AIR FORCE TEST RANGES **SQUADRON**

Air Force Test Ranges Squadron is responsible for the day-to-day conduct of test range activities. RAAF and Australian public service personnel make up the squadron with the majority based at RAAF Base Edinburgh. Operations and technical personnel are on permanent detachment at Woomera Range to provide on-site liaison and management of range activities. Edinburgh-based personnel deploy to other Air Force ranges as operational tasking requires.

DIRECTORATE OF AIR INTELLIGENCE

The Directorate of Air Intelligence is responsible for provision and training of Air Force's

intelligence capability. While its headquarters and some elements are at Edinburgh, it is also the most geographically distributed directorate in the AWC, with personnel at all the major RAAF bases and also within the Defence Complex in Canberra. Further, because of its functions, it has personnel deployed on exercises and operations, including the Middle East, on an almost continual basis.



NO.83 **SQUADRON** Newly established in January 2021, 83

Squadron is the Air Force's centralised intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR) processing, exploitation and dissemination intelligence weapon system. Through the exploitation of imagery and signals intelligence, it provides the ADF and allied forces timely, accurate, relevant and actionable intelligence. The unit was established from the Distributed Ground Station (Interim) Project initiative and will continue to grow over the coming years playing a key role in expanding RAAF Edinburgh ISR capabilities.



NO.87 **SQUADRON**

87 Squadron (87SON) was re-formed on 1 July 2006, and is the Air Force's mission intelligence squadron. 87SQN comprises approximately 150 personnel, predominantly

air intelligence analysts and officers, and is headquartered in RAAF Williamtown. 87SQN has eight Tactical Intelligence Flights (TIFs) at RAAF Bases Amberley, Edinburgh, Richmond, Tindal, and Williamtown, providing mission intelligence to multiple FEGs, wings and units. 87SQN personnel support multiple RAAF and ADF operations, exercises and activities across single service and joint domains. RAAF Base Edinburgh TIFs include 41TIF, 42TIF, and 92TIF.

DEFENCE SCHOOL OF INTELLIGENCE - AIR

Initially formed as the Air Intelligence Training Unit on 1 January 2017, the Defence School of Intelligence – Air (DSI-Air) mission is to develop and deliver all source air intelligence training to meet the needs of Air Force's evolving capability requirements. DSI-Air conducts initial employment training and post-graduate training for air intelligence officers and air intelligence analysts.

SPECTRUM WARFARE **DIRECTORATE**

Spectrum Warfare Directorate is comprised of a Headquarters located at DST Edinburgh, and two units: Joint Electronic Warfare Operational Support Unit also at DST Edinburgh; and 80 SQN at the USAF's Eglin Air Force Base, Florida, US.

Spectrum Warfare Directorate delivers critical electromagnetic spectrum survivability and operational mission data enabling effects to various ADF platforms across the integrated force; enabling war-fighter tactical situation awareness, ensuring freedom of action and assuring mission effectiveness, through enhancing lethality, survivability and resilience.

In addition to delivery of operational support to ADF platforms, the HQ and Units also maintain direct and productive relationships with Allies, in order to reliably contribute technical information and specialist advice, as well as survivability and operational mission data contributions, to and with Allies.



IOINT ELECTRONIC WARFARE **OPERATIONAL** SUPPORT UNIT

Located at

DST Edinburgh, Joint Electronic Warfare Operational Support Unit (JEWOSU) is the ADF's electronic warfare centre of excellence. It delivers operational mission data and system reprogramming support to ADF fixed-wing aircraft, helicopters, ships and submarines, as well as optimisation of the survivability systems for ADF aviation assets.

JEWOSU also provides formal Electronic Warfare training and specialist advice to the ADO.

TEST AND EVALUATION DIRECTORATE

Test and Evaluation Directorate (TED), within the RAAF AWC has responsibility for managing aircraft stores compatibility, as well as test and evaluation for Air Force. These capabilities contribute to the mission success, safe performance, safe operation and survivability of ADF aircraft and aircrew. TED is comprised of the Aircraft Research and Development Unit, Air Warfare Engineering Squadron and Directorate Headquarters.

AIRCRAFT RESEARCH AND **DEVELOPMENT** UNIT

The Aircraft Research and Development Unit (ARDU) plans, conducts and analyses the results of flight tests of existing and new Air

Force capabilities. ARDU's headquarters is at RAAF Base Edinburgh with flights located at RAAF Bases Edinburgh, Amberley and Williamtown, ARDU is staffed by qualified test pilots, flight test engineers, flight test system specialists, and operational evaluation aircrew. The unit provides flight test and evaluation for Air Command to support the in-being, objective and future joint force.

AIR WARFARE ENGINEERING SQUADRON

The Air Warfare Engineering Squadron was formed in 2016 following the amalgamation of Aircraft Stores Compatibility Engineering Squadron

and Aircraft Systems Engineering Squadron. It provides specialist engineering services to the AWC, Air Force, Army, Navy and wider elements of Defence to enhance joint air power capabilities, and has specific expertise in:

- provision of aircraft stores compatibility engineering advice and designs
- design and operation of aircraft instrumentation and telemetry systems
- electromagnetic interference/ compatibility testing.



NO.1 COMBAT COMMUNICATIONS SQUADRON

No.1 Combat Communications Squadrons' (1CCS) mission is to provide assured Network Operations capability to enable the conduct of expeditionary

air operations in support of the joint force. To achieve its mission, ICCS must understand those we are supporting, understand their mission, and ensure it provides the relevant CIS services to achieve mission success. Our responsibility is to deliver resilient and cyberworthy CIS, ensuring safety and risk is managed to protect all personnel. 1CCS operates in an environment that demands excellence and we must set a solid foundation for continuous improvement and innovation to: meet our mission; develop, train and retain our people; and set the conditions for success in the future. 1CCS is geographically dispersed with its HQ located in Amberley (AP2) and three flights located at RAAF Bases Edinburgh, Amberley, and Williamtown. .



NO.1 REMOTE SENSOR UNIT

Entering its 10th year as No.1 Remote Sensor Unit, 1RSU conducts surveillance of Australia's northern approaches by collecting, analysing and disseminating data into the ADF's common operating picture. Sitting

within 41WG, SRG, 1RSU operates the Jindalee Operational Radar Network, a network of three Over-the-Horizon Radar systems stationed in Alice Springs NT, Longreach Qld and Laverton WA. Previously known as No.1 Radar surveillance



unit, 1RSU was formed in July 1992 just north of Alice Springs and, in January 1993, commenced operations using the original Jindalee radar for surveillance tasks. 1RSU soon thereafter relocated to RAAF Edinburgh, having recently celebrated its 25th year in location. 1RSU still maintains close ties with communities in Alice Spring and are due to return to Alice springs to celebrate the 30th anniversary of 1RSU being granted Freedom of the City in 2025. Working out of the Battlespace Surveillance centre, 1RSU works closely with the SACTU and 87 SQN detachments and is staffed by Air Force and Navy members as well as civilian contractors.

SURVEILLANCE & CONTROL TRAINING UNIT EDINBURGH **DETACHMENT (SACTU)**

SACTU conducts initial employment training and post initial employment training for Air Battle Managers and Air Surveillance Operators. It also provides specialist training for maintenance

personnel and other air and missile defence professionals in the ADF. Although the main body is located at RAAF Base Williamtown, SACTU has a detachment in Edinburgh. SACTU Detachment Edinburgh is responsible for the development, delivery and modernisation of all No.1 Remote Sensor Unit training to ensure capability requirements are met for the successful operation of the Jindalee Operational Radar Network.



NO 2 **EXPEDITIONARY HEALTH SOUADRON DETACHMENT RAAF EDINBURGH**

The role of No.2 Expeditionary Health Squadron (2EHS) is

to provide expeditionary and fixed-base health support to ADF operations. With a headquarters at RAAF Base Williamtown, detachments are located at RAAF Bases Darwin, Edinburgh, Pearce and Tindal. 2EHS Detachment Edinburgh comprises medical officers, dental assistant, nursing officers, environmental health officers and advanced medical assistants. The detachment is embedded in the Edinburgh Joint Health Command Garrison Health Centre. While the primary duty of 2EHS Det EDN is the provision of expeditionary healthcare capability, 2EHS personnel regularly augment the Garrison Health Centre when not deployed. In this respect, 2EHS Det Edinburgh also supports exercises at Woomera Test Range, Murray Bridge Training Area and Cultana Training Area.

NO. 464 SOUADRON **DETACHMENT EDINBURGH**

No. 464 Squadron was re-established in January 2021 under the Information Warfare Directorate of the Air Warfare Centre, providing public affairs and imagery support.

On 1 July 2023, No. 464 Squadron's command and control transferred to the Chief of Staff Branch under Air Force Headquarters. Headquartered at HMAS Harman in Canberra, the squadron has evolved with military public affairs flights that encompass high-readiness deployable military camera teams at RAAF Bases Richmond, Williamtown, Amberley, Darwin, Edinburgh and Canberra. It also coordinates and trains the highly skilled Specialist Reserve Public Affairs Officer workforce across the country.

The squadron provides public affairs and imagery support to high profile public events, Air Force and wider Defence exercises and operations, including significant support to HQJOC activities as directed by CAF and CDF. The squadron was originally formed in September 1942, flying Ventura bombers from bases in England. It later re-equipped with Mosquito fighter bombers, which were flown in precision attacks on German targets at low level. This included attacking the Amiens Prison in France – also known as Operation Jericho – and other similar raids which led the squadron to be nicknamed The Gestapo Hunters.

NO.92 WING

Formed in 1977 at RAAF Base Edinburgh, No.92 Wing was the first maritime wing in the RAAF. Previous to this, maritime and reconnaissance commitments were met by two independent

maritime squadrons. The co-location of two squadrons enabled considerable savings in labour and facilities by combining the units under the one umbrella of a maritime wing -No.92 Wing.

92 Wing now consists of Numbers 9, 10, 11 and 292 Squadrons. In addition to the traditional roles of anti-submarine and antisurface warfare, the wing is also responsible for long-range intelligence, surveillance, reconnaissance, electronic warfare and search and survivor supply missions.



NO.9 **SQUADRON**

No.9 Squadron originally formed in 1939 operating Seagull Mk V and Walrus amphibious aircraft providing fleet support to Australian, New Zealand and United Kingdom vessels in all

theatres of World War II before disbanding in 1944.

No.9 Squadron reformed in 1962 operating UH-1B Iroquois helicopters providing search and rescue and tactical air transport. It saw active service in Vietnam before disbanding again in 1989.

No.9 Squadron reformed again in 2023 to operate the MQ-4C Triton that will provide the integrated force with long-range, persistent and networked intelligence, surveillance, reconnaissance and targeting.

No.9 Squadron's distinguished service includes 12 battle honours during WWII, and one from the Vietnam War. Its crest features the black-browed albatross—an Australian native species capable of long endurance overwater flight representing the MQ-4C Triton capability, and its motto is Videmus nec Videmur (To see and not be seen).



NO.10 **SQUADRON**

Formed in 1939, No.10 Squadron now operates Air Force's electronic warfare (EW) capability, performing a multitude of tasks including Intelligence, surveillance and

reconnaissance. 10SQN aircrew, maintenance and support personnel regularly deploy to a wide variety of operations and exercises within Australia and overseas. Over the coming years, 10SQN will transition from the AP-3C(EW) Orion (retired in late 2023) to the MC-55A Peregrine aircraft.

NO.11 **SQUADRON**

No.11 Squadron is Australia's premier maritime strike, patrol, reconnaissance and response squadron. The 'Blackcats' of 11SQN have transitioned operations

from the Lockheed Martin AP-3C Orion to the latest generation in maritime patrol aircraft, the Boeing P-8A Poseidon.

Roles conducted by 11SQN include antisubmarine warfare, anti-surface warfare, maritime strike, maritime intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR), overland Intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance, and search and rescue.

No.11 Squadron is a highly operational unit that is continuously deployed across domestic, regional and, at times, global theatres to gather intelligence, conduct international engagement and train to deliver integrated effects as a key element of the joint force.



NO.292 **SOUADRON**

Originally formed as Maritime Analysis Training Squadron in 1977, 292SQN is an operational conversion unit. Part of 92 Wing, it is responsible for training the following musterings on specialised P-8A Poseidon

Aircrew and Technical aircraft courses:

Pilots – P-8A co-pilot conversion, responsible for safely operating the P-8A and assisting the aircraft captain.

Maritime Patrol and Response Officers (MPRO)

- P-8A co-tactical coordinator conversion, responsible for communication and assisting the tactical coordinator.

Airborne Electronic Analyst – P-8A acoustic warfare operator and electronic warfare operator conversion, responsible for employing and optimising the aircraft sensors.

Technicians – Aircraft/avionics and armament technical courses - P-8A type courses, and specialist armament courses.

292SQN also provides specialised training, including P-8A engine operators course, junior technical leadership courses and aviation technical supervisor courses. 292SQN currently provides pilot, MPRO and technical training for the RNZAF P-8A personnel, while they bring their training facilities into service. The world leading aircrew and technical simulation facilities allow for initial and conversion training for members of 92WG, Boeing Defence Australia, and RNZAF personnel with a reduced need for operational aircraft use.



NO.24 SQUADRON

No.24 (City of Adelaide) Squadron is one of nine operational squadrons within 95Wing, Combat Support Group (CSG). Its mission is to deliver permanent airbase capability at RAAF Base Edinburgh while

supporting expeditionary operations.

24SQN is responsible for key functions including the Air Base Operations Centre, airbase security, base aviation safety, road and air movements, mechanical equipment operations and maintenance and operation of the Defence Fuel Installation – Aviation, as well as chaplaincy and physical and recreational training. While it is no longer a flying squadron, 24SQN enables the air operations for the four flying squadrons stationed at Edinburgh.

24SQN has a proud history serving with distinction in World War II in Papua New Guinea flying dive bombers and later in the Dutch East Indies flying heavy bombers.



NO.453 **SQUADRON EDINBURGH FLIGHT**

No.453 Squadron was initially formed in May 1941 as a fighter squadron, later disbanding in January 1946. The unit was reformed on

1 December 2010 to provide quality air base air traffic services to RAAF Edinburgh, Williamtown, Richmond, East Sale, Pearce and HMAS Albatross.

The Edinburgh flight is one of the smallest units on base, but fulfils the essential task of ensuring all aircraft in the area are provided with safe passage in the form of air traffic control, as well ensuring air navigation systems are maintained and serviced at the highest level. It also supports RAAF base communications through its highly

trained technical workforce and provides flying display support and airspace management of the RAAF Edinburgh airspace volumes through close consultation with civil industry.



INSTITUTE OF AVIATION MEDICINE

Part of Air Force Training Group, the RAAF Institute of Aviation Medicine is the ADF centre of excellence in aerospace medicine. The institute

enhances aircrew performance and safety in ADF aerospace operations by providing contemporary, relevant and timely aeromedical advice, training, risk-based decision support and confirmation of fitness for aviation-related duties. The unit is staffed by uniformed and civilian personnel with diverse skills in aviation, aviation medicine, human factors and aeronautical life support.



THE 9TH BRIGADE

HEADOUARTERED AT KESWICK BARRACKS

in South Australia, the 9th Brigade is an integrated combat brigade that comprises the following Regular and Reserve units.

- 9th Brigade Headquarters
- 1st Armoured Regiment
- 7th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment
- 10th/27th Battalion, Royal South Australia Reaiment
- 9th Combat Service Support Battalion
- 144th Signal Squadron

The 9th Brigade was initially raised in 1912 following the introduction of the compulsory training scheme, and formed part of the Australian Imperial Force when the 3rd Australian Division was raised in 1916. The 9th Brigade fought on the Western Front in France and Belgium, most notably at Messines, Passchendaele, Villers-Bretonneux and Morlancourt.

The brigade was disbanded in 1921 and was re-raised as part of the Citizen Military Forces. Since that time, the 9th Brigade has generated part-time land forces to serve in the defence of Australia and its national interests.

Under the restructuring of the Combat Brigades initiative, the 9th Brigade became a fully integrated Brigade in 2022, when Edinburghbased full-time units came under command. The command change of the 9th Brigade from the 2nd Division to Forces Command provided increased opportunities to integrate the Total Workforce System. The 9th Brigade draws upon all service categories to generate combat teams, battle groups and a joint task force domestic response operations. The 9th Brigade is the lead brigade for domestic disaster relief and domestic security support within South Australia.

1ST ARMOURED REGIMENT

In 2025, 1st Armoured Regiment will transition from an Armoured Cavalry Regiment to an

experimentation unit to help Army meet the outcomes of the National Defence Strategy. This transition sees 1st Armoured Regiment in a position to work closely with Defence Science and Technology, the Advanced Strategic Capabilities Accelerator, academia, and the wider defence industry to exploit technological advantages and develop future operating concepts.

The regiment will be at the forefront of fielding, evaluating, and assisting with the integration of emerging technologies, which provide operational advantages in war. The regiment's location in Adelaide ensures proximity to similarly focused organisations and facilities, allowing a more integrated approach in the adoption of new and emerging technology. As the Army's experimentation unit, the regiment will also work with other Army organisations focused on robotics and autonomous systems.

This transition is a significant step in the regiment's 75-year history, as it moves from traditional armoured land combat to perform a pathfinding function through technology for the rest of Army. Although it presents a solemn change from our traditions, our customs will remain strong. As the senior unit in the Royal Australian Armoured Corps, once again, the regiment is proud to be at the forefront of the Army's main effort.

7TH BATTALION, ROYAL **AUSTRALIAN REGIMENT**

The 7th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (7 RAR) is a mechanised infantry battalion structured around the Battalion Headquarters, three rifle companies, a support company of specialist platoons, and an administration company, responsible for logistical support to the Battalion.

7 RAR has had a broad and prestigious history of service to Australia since being raised in 1965 as part of the Australian commitment to operations

in South East Asia. It was during its initial founding that the battalion earned the moniker 'Pig Battalion'. The first commanding officer of the battalion, Colonel Eric Smith, inspected the battalion's area and found the soldiers' conduct deplorable. He called a parade the following day to share his unfiltered thoughts. During the speech he was quoted "You are nothing but a mob of pigs", to which a back ranker called out "oink oink", solidifying their identity as the Pig Battalion.

The battalion went on to serve two tours in Vietnam, in 1967 and again in 1971. During those tours, 33 members of the battalion were killed in action, with 220 being wounded on operations. The battalion saw continuous action, conducting routine patrols and ambushes. It participated in several large-scale battles, including the famous Battle of Suoi Chau Pha where A Company fought an encounter battle with a reinforced VC Company of the 3rd Battalion, 274th Regiment. The Pigs won their engagement, killing roughly 200 enemy combatants, however five Australians were killed with another dying of his wounds later.

The battalion was linked with 5 RAR in 1973 following the withdrawal of Australian forces from Vietnam, and the reduction in the size of the Australian Army. This link was maintained until 2006, when 7 RAR was de-linked from 5 RAR and returned to the Australian Army Order of Battle. The battalion provided support to operations in East Timor in 2007 and 2008, before deploying on Operation Slipper in Afghanistan in 2009 and 2010. During the 2009 rotation, the battalion was involved in the Battle of Kakarak, where one member was killed in action.

7 RAR has subsequently been involved in multiple rotations through the Middle East, supporting operations in both Afghanistan and Iraq. These included support to Reconstruction Task Force – 1, Mentoring and Reconstruction Task Force - 1, Advisor Task Force - 1 and 2, and Task Group Taji - Rotation 3.

7RAR is planned to leave Edinburgh and relocate to the Northern Territory as part of the current government's Defence review, but it will remain active in the Edinburgh Defence community for at least the next two years.

9 COMBAT SERVICE SUPPORT **BATTALION, 1ST COMBAT** SERVICE SUPPORT TEAM

1st Combat Service Support Team (1 CSST) is a sub-unit of 9 Combat Service Support Battalion (9 CSSB), which has its Battalion Headquarters and an Army Reserve sub-unit located in Warradale. 1 CSST is unique in that it has been specifically equipped and staffed to directly support the manoeuvre

units co-located at RAAF Edinburgh (1 ARMD REGT and 7 RAR), and comprises elements of each logistic discipline to support the 9th Brigade Direct Command Units (DCU) in South Australia.

1 CSST was originally a sub unit of 1 CSSB, as part of the 1st Brigade, which moved to South Australia in 2015 for the specific role of providing combat service support to a mechanised or armoured battlegroup. In 2022, the South Australian units of the 1st Brigade were moved under command of the 9th Brigade, with 1 CSST becoming part of 9 CSSB. 1 CSST still maintains its role to provide combat service support to a battlegroup which consists of a workshop platoon capable of medium grade repairs, a transport troop capable of supply distribution including bulk water and fuel, and heavy road freight, and a warehouse platoon that manages the supply chain for 9th Brigade units in the region. Since being in South Australia, 1 CSST has been heavily involved in domestic operations providing support to OP Bushfire Assist, OP Flood Assist, and OP COVID assist.



THE 10TH BRIGADE

The 10th Fires Brigade is based out of RAAF Base Edinburgh and was developed as a program under the Army Objective Force to

realise elements of the 'future ready' requirements of the Army. Established on the 16 January 2023, the 10th Brigade consolidates Army's contribution to joint integrated air and missile defence and multi domain strike under a fires formation.

To achieve the desired end state, 16 Regiment, operating NASAM Short Ranged Air Defence, and 9 Regiment, Royal Australian Artillery, operating small UAS, transitioned to 10 Brigade in 2024.

The brigade will also raise 14 Regiment, Royal Australian Artillery, which will operate the M142 High Mobility Artillery Rocket System, HIMARS. This will be Australia's first rocket artillery system, and is capable of engaging targets at 300km. The system will be Army's contribution to multidomain strike and long range fires.

The growth of these elements will see the 10 Brigade presence at RAAF Base Edinburgh grow from the current Brigade Headquarters to include two regiments, co-located at RAAF Base Edinburgh, and Army Reserve batteries located in all Australian states.

The 10th Brigade was originally raised in New South Wales as an Infantry Brigade in 1912. In 1916, it became part of the Australian Imperial Force and fought in Gallipoli and the Western Front in World War I. Briefly disbanded in 1919, it was re-raised in 1921 as a part-time formation in Victoria, but disbanded in 1942 prior to conducting any overseas operations in World War II.

10 Brigade, throughout its expansion, will support a wide range of response options on behalf of the Australian Government and enable a whole of government effort to shape, deter

and respond to threats in our near region. The effectiveness of brigade systems will be further enhanced through joint integration with other platforms located within the EDP.





ARMY EDUCATION CENTRE

Army Education Centre - Central West (AEC-CW) provides educational support to ADF members

in South Australia. AEC-CW provides the following services:

 - Cognitive skills

 - Academic tutoring and proof-reading.

 - applying and preparing for university and Tafe courses
 - understanding Defence Educational Support Schemes.

ARMY SCHOOL OF ELECTRICAL **MECHANICAL ENGINEERING**

Since 2013, the Army School of Electrical Mechanical Engineering (ASEME SA), has maintained a presence within the RAAF Edinburgh precinct, in the form of a regional on the job training (OJT) cell. The cell manages and enables the up to 60 RAEME trainees as they complete the final phase of their apprenticeship and transitions them from the training force into the trained force. The cell also manages the training for fitter armourer, vehicle mechanic, technician electrical and technician electronic system trade groups.

ASEME SA OJT Cell also has arrangements to assist in the supply of training environments for the RAAF GSEFIT trainees, and is in discussions with the RAN to identify possibilities for future inter service opportunities.

The ASEME SA OJT cell currently operates out of the HQ 1 BDE building, which has fostered a fantastic relationship between all brigade units and ASEME; however, in the near future the OJT cell will be relocating to be within the Warrant Officer and Non-Commissioned Officer Academy, an exciting change.

The OJT cell has developed an extensive network of both civilian and military workplaces throughout the greater Adelaide region, which provide in depth technical experience and exposure from which the trainees can draw upon as they set out and begin their careers within the corps of RAEME.



ARMY PERSONNEL SUPPORT CENTRE

The Army Personnel Support Centre (APSC) has two support functions and capabilities at

Edinburgh Defence Precinct.

Army Personnel Administration Centre South Australia (APAC SA) provides uniform payroll and personnel administration support to dependant units within SA. Based at Building 941 at RAAF Edinburgh (near the Front Gate), APSU SA provides subject matter advice to soldiers and commanders on Conditions of Service entitlements. APSC -APSU SA supports commanders as the conduit for decision briefs for DGPERS-A consideration as required, ensuring that the appropriate policy is matched with the request.

Army Personnel Support Unit - Trade, Transfer and Retention Detachment -South Australia (APSU TTD SA) provides governance assurance that all Army personnel are separation ready by providing effective support, coordination, administrative oversight, and command to assist our people and their families through the transition process.

Based at Edinburgh Parks 2, APSU TTDU SA acts as a direct point of contact to coordinate and assist Army personnel and their families through the transition process. Trade Transfer and Retention

Warrant Officers assist Army personnel by providing advice on corps transfer, trade transfer, officer training (ADFA and RMC), service transfer (RAN and RAAF) and the transfer from SERCAT 7 to another SERCAT. Member support coordinators (MSCs) are located in support of Army units and also administrative commanding officers to support members in non-Army groups. MSCs are able to provide all commanders with the additional skills and resources required to ensure the appropriate level of support is provided to wounded, injured and ill members.

BATTLE SIMULATION SITE – ADELAIDE

Battle Simulation Site – Adelaide (BSS-A) is a Land Simulation and Wargaming function of The Army Battle Lab. BSS-A is located at the rear of the Monash Centre in the heart of RAAF Base Edinburgh within building HO832.

The BSS-A primary role is to facilitate and provide simulation support and training delivery to local Army units in the SA region, which also includes experimentation for DSTG and out-of-hours training for Army Reserves units.

Together with the six other regional battle simulation sites, BSS-A fields the nation's principal Defence capability for virtual and constructive simulation support and training. Utilising the latest versions of the military-off-the-shelf software (VBS3, Steel Beasts Pro and JCATS), units can realise arguably the highest return on training efficiency for their expenditure in time and finance without the usual WH&S, admin and resource constraints. For example, in a training session supported by the BSS-A staff, users initially grasp sufficient competency to control an entity or avatar in a tactical/operational training environment. From there users can then be integrated into their micro-teams and then subsequently macro-teams operating at the combat team level.

The artificial intelligence as well as the after action review (AAR) record functions within the software enable command and staff to analyse their coursesof-action, post decision-making and conduct rehearsal of concept drills. The AAR tool allows instant replay from every point-of-view - including the opposing force's – to optimise lessons-to-belearnt. While the BSS-A "fitted-for/not fitted-with" establishment does not permit turnkey solutions, the tailored train-the-trainer packages facilitate user units to attain the training required to support their desired end state. BSS-A staff encourage units to organise a time in advance to discuss their training programs and requirements prior to booking the BSS. This will allow the BSS-A staff to synchronise. support and facilitate units training outcomes.

The BSS-A staff look forward to demonstrating the resident capabilities, showing you throughout the facility to support your training outcomes.

CORPORATE AND ENABLING SERVICES

The Associate Secretary Group integrates the work of different parts of the Defence Organisation to get more effective and efficient outcomes, particularly in the areas of service delivery. SEG develops and sustains the Defence Estate and is the consolidated security and service delivery organisation for Defence. SEG designs and delivers Defence infrastructure and manages a complex Defence Estate — maintaining environmental stewardship of more than 2.8 million hectares, the largest landholding in the Commonwealth with 70 major bases, 100-

plus training ranges, more than 1,000 leased or owned properties and 30,000 built assets.

SEG provides Defence protective security, manages the Defence Industry Security Program and delivers security clearances to Defence, government and industry through the AGSVA. SEG delivers base services including access control, catering and hospitality, accommodation, building and grounds maintenance, firefighting, cleaning and laundry. SEG is also leading integrated and digital service delivery.

At RAAF Woomera, the SEG contractor also provides commercial operations such as the Eldo Hotel, and emergency services including ambulance and fire response.

DSTG is headed by the Chief Defence Scientist, Prof Tanya Monro AC.


DSTG's site at Edinburgh is the largest of eight sites around Australia. Other DSTG sites are located in Brisbane, Sydney, Melbourne, Canberra, HMAS Stirling in Rockingham near Perth, Scottsdale in north east Tasmania, and Innisfail in North Queensland.

Employing approximately 2,100 people, DSTG provides scientific advice and technology solutions across all military domains, including:

- Maritime
- · Land and joint warfare
- Air and space
- Sensors and effectors
- Intelligence and surveillance
- · Cyber, intelligence and national security
- Information sciences
- Human and decision sciences
- Platforms
- Research technology and operations.

DSTG's accomplishments and contributions to Defence capability are many. Many will know DSTG as the birth place of the Black Box Flight Recorder, but its achievements go far beyond that.

DSTG developed the Jindalee Operational Radar Network which provides 24-hour military

surveillance of Australia's northern and western approaches. It was responsible for Nulka, an active missile decoy that protects ships from missiles. Nulka was sold to the US and Canada in the 1990s and is considered one of Australia's most successful Defence exports, earning revenue in excess of \$1 billion.

DSTG developed the wing kit that converts Boeing's standard Joint Direct Attack Munition (JDAM) into a long-range glide bomb. The kit extends the range of the smart bomb to more than three times the standard distance, providing delivery aircraft far greater protection against air defence systems, while maintaining accuracy to within three to seven metres.

DSTG supported Australia's response to the COVID-19 pandemic, helping to model the spread of the disease, applying its unique engineering expertise to design and produce medical face shields, and developing a device that can convert non-invasive ventilators to invasive ventilators to treat seriously ill patients.

NO.1 SPACE SURVEILLANCE UNIT

No.1 Space Surveillance Unit (1SSU) was formed in January 2023 as the first dedicated Australian joint space unit providing combatrelevant space domain awareness and missile warning effects in support of joint and coalition forces. The unit was established to absorb current space capabilities and build capacity for the introduction of new sovereign and international partnered space capabilities in the future. ISSU operates a diverse range of Earth and space-based capabilities to perform consistent observation and analysis of onorbit and terrestrial events followed by timely dissemination to a range of customers. This is achieved through the effective operation of the Space Surveillance Telescope, C-Band Radar and the Space Based Infra-Red Systems –Australian Mission Processor. Additionally, 1SSU recently stood up the Commercial Data Mission Centre (CDMC) which leverages commercial providers allowing the unit to contribute to the Joint Commercial Operations - Pacific Cell and provide sovereign tasking over Australian assets. The CDMC operates entirely in the unclassified environment and is currently based out of Lot 14 within the Adelaide CBD.



IOINT LOGISTICS UNIT (SOUTH)

Joint Logistics Unit (South) (JLU(S)) is a highly effective, fully integrated team of skilled

logisticians delivering essential logistics services to our regional and national dependencies. Together with De-fence industry partners Linfox and Ventia, JLU(S) provides a range of essential logistics functions including: warehousing; distribution; materiel maintenance; loan and repair pools; combat kitting and issues; retail

clothing; weapons storage and repair; hazardous goods management; electronic instrument repair; regional procurement; and operations and plans support. JLU(S) supports combat elements from all three Services that are either based or operating within SA including those exercising at training areas in Cultana, Murray Bridge, Port Wakefield and Woomera. JLU(S) is also the primary storage and maintenance unit for several critical platforms and capabilities within the SA region.



NO.462 **SQUADRON**

No. 462 Squadron sits within ADF's newly established Cyber Command under Joint Capabilities Group and is headquartered at DST Edinburgh. 462SQN's mission is the execution

of cyberspace operations in order to counter cyber threats to the Defence mission, defend key terrain, and secure freedom of manoeuvre for friendly forces. 462SQN's cyber protection mission is enabled by a tactical intelligence flight (87SQN), training flight, operations support flight and engineering flight. An additional cyber protection flight is now established at RAAF base Williamtown, 462SON also provides an information assurance function to Air Force mission systems by providing ICT security assessments, as well as emissions security and vulnerability assessments for the integrated force. It supports initial employment training for ADF's cyber warfare workforce, generating personnel who contribute to operations and exercises across the world. Since its reform in April 2005, 462SQN has evolved from its proud Bomber Command history to a leading ADF capability in cyberspace operations.

IOINT SURVIVABILITY, TACTICS VALIDATION UNIT

The Joint Survivability Tactics Validation Unit was established in January 2021 to provide survivability support to the integrated force against threats that operate in the electro magnetic spectrum. Reporting to Joint Capabilities Group and supported by DSTG, JSTVU is focussed predominantly in the maritime and land domains but also works closely with JEWOSU.

JOINT HEALTH UNIT (CENTRAL), EDINBURGH **HEALTH CENTRE**

The Edinburgh Health Centre (EDNHC), along with smaller clinics at Keswick and Woodside, provides health care to ADF members and ensures the health preparedness of all ADF personnel posted to the Adelaide area. Health service delivery is provided by a mix of ADF, APS and contracted civilian staff. EDNHC is part of Joint Health Unit Central Australia, Joint Health Command. The Health Centre, on McNamara Drive adjacent to the parade ground, provides sick parade, GP appointments, dental, pharmacy, mental health and psychology services, occupational rehabilitation support and a 22-bed ward for ADF personnel.

The 1st Joint Movement Unit (1JMU) provides movement effects for ADF operations, actions and investments in support of force projection, sustainment

and redeployment. With detachments positioned across Australia, 1JMU provides support to a wide range of military operations. actions and activities each year.

Joint Movement Section South Australia (JMS SA) is responsible for movement support within the SA area of responsibility. With an integrated team made up of full-time members from the Navy, Army, Air Force, APS and reservist Army members; JMS SA has a breadth of knowledge and experience within ADF logistic operations.

Throughout 2024, JMS SA has been busy supporting a variety of ADF exercises and operations. Some of our achievements involve supporting operations such as Op Lilia, Op Gateway and Op Kudu. JMS SA also provides ongoing support to ADF exercises, some of which in 2024 include RIMPAC, Leadfoot, REDEX and Pitch Black. In supporting these, JMS SA has worked closely with several customer units to ensure effective movement support is provided.

IOINT MILITARY POLICE STATION - ADELAIDE

Established in 2020, the JMPF integrates the former single-service general duties policing elements together with the ADF Investigative Service. The mission of JMPF is to deliver focused, integrated military police effects both domestically and internationally.

In South Australia, the JMPF operates primarily from the Joint Military Police Station - Adelaide, located in Building 333 at the main entrance to RAAF Base Edinburgh. However, military policing effects are delivered to all Defence Establishments across the State.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA WING. **WARRANT OFFICER AND NON COMMISSIONED** OFFICER ACADEMY

The South Australia Wing, Warrant Officer and Non Commissioned Officer Academy (WONCO-A) is an independent sub unit that manages four; eight week, Subject 1 Corporal Army course each year. With the motto Lead, Mentor, Train, South Australia Wing,

WONCO-A aims to qualify Private in the All Corps requirements of command, leadership, management, operations and training for the rank of Corporal.

SURVEILLANCE AND RESPONSE SYSTEMS PROGRAM OFFICE

Surveillance and Response SPO (SRSPO), previously Maritime Patrol SPO, forms part of Capability Acquisition and Sustainment Group (CASG) Air Domain. SRSPO provides sustainment support to the P-8 Poseidon and future unmanned aerial vehicles, and is the acquisition agency for Project AIR7003.

SRSPO also provides sustainment support for all aeronautical life support equipment to Army, Navy and Air Force across 18 different aircraft platforms. The underpinning workforce to achieve this intent is achieved through a combination of ADF, public servants and contractors.

WIDE AREA AND SPACE **SURVEILLANCE SYSTEMS PROGRAM OFFICE**

Wide Area and Space Surveillance Systems Program Office (WASS SPO) was formed in 2003 and is part of the Air and Space Surveillance and Control Branch with the Capability Acquisition and Sustainment Group (CASG). Its primary role is to provide wide area and space surveillance through the Jindalee Operational Radar Network and various space surveillance capabilities to Defence. These capabilities enable Defence, in particular RAAF 1 Remote Sensor Unit, to conduct effective surveillance in support of the ADF's situational awareness. WASS SPO is based at the Defence Science and Technology Edinburgh site. Its 103-strong workforce is a combination of ADF, APS and contractor personnel.

AUSTRALIAN AIR FORCE CADETS (AAFC)

The AAFC is a youth-development organisation set in a military and aviation environment, administered and actively supported by the RAAF. 6 Wing covers squadrons located within South Australia and Mildura.

Activities include aviation, aircraft recognition, fieldcraft, radio communications, firearms safety training and science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) projects such as 3D printing and construction and operation of remotecontrolled airborne drones. Cadets may choose to undertake leadership courses toward promotion, gaining skills in leadership and management, public speaking and organisational planning.

Through advocacy and by providing advice to key decision-makers, DFA aims to reduce the height and frequency of hurdles faced by military families, prepare families to overcome them, and

where possible, remove hurdles completely.

DFA is working to address and advocate for change across a number of areas including communication with families, flexible housing, education, family stability and family employment.

DFA's advocacy goals are developed in collaboration with Defence branches and stakeholders, including the Defence Member and Family Support branch, Defence's Recruitment and Retention (R2) team, Defence Housing Australia, the Senior Enlisted Advisor to the Chief of the Defence Force, and many others.

KOOKABURRA KIDS

The Department of Veterans' Affairs is funding the Australian Kookaburra Kids Foundation (AKKF) to offer clinically designed mental health literacy programs that integrate fun and recreation with mental health education.

Delivered free to registered young people, our unique stepped-care model offers preearly intervention mental health services and education designed to meet the needs of serving and ex-serving families in our Defence Kids program through camps, activity days and online connect sessions. Evidence shows these programs have a significant impact in improving the mental health literacy of the participating young people which will lead to better long-term mental health outcomes. Every opportunity our Kookaburra Kids have to participate in our programs involves a genuine connection with other young people and aims to empower them to thrive beyond the impacts of family mental illness.

Camps and activity days are held throughout the year, providing an opportunity for children to connect, improve mental health literacy

and improve help-seeking behaviours. Activity days can include ice skating, laser tag, bowling, movies, putt putt golf, beach activities and more. Two-night camps generally run from Friday afternoon to Sunday afternoon, but may be held on weekdays during school holidays. Camps incorporate multiple recreational activities with a 45 minute "Chat Group" each day.

Volunteers form an integral part of the Kookaburra Kids team; we can't run our programs without them. Our volunteer program provides an opportunity for people to participate in programs that are engaging, fun and contribute to the positive wellbeing of young people. A key point of difference in the success of our program is in the flexibility we offer our volunteers in how they would like to volunteer.

SUPPORTING THE **LOCAL COMMUNITY**

HE EDINBURGH DEFENCE **PRECINCT** and its staff share important relationships with the local and broader communities and greatly contribute to the local community through various means. A key focus is on schools, veterans, charities, heritage, indigenous and the

DEFENCE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

local community in general.

The Defence Assistance Program (DAP) is a Defence-funded initiative where Defence partners with community organisation to provide opportunities for people with disability to engage in meaningful work. At Edinburgh, DAP services are provided through the Endeavour Foundation, a not-forprofit organisation that has been supporting

people with disability for more than 70 years. The Defence Assistance Program is a great opportunity to provide employment, training, skill development and career pathway options for people with disability.

DEFENCE BLOOD CHALLENGE

Every year Edinburgh Defence Precinct responds to the Australian Red Cross Blood Service call to give blood. Mobile blood bank vans are established at both RAAF Edinburgh and DST-E several times a year. Timings and locations are published in the EDP Information Circular in the lead up to the vans being on the sites.

CHARITIES

The EDP supports local charities and not-forprofit organisations in various ways, providing an important means for Defence staff to support the less fortunate people in the local community and those organisations supporting them. While a key focus is on veteran organisations such as the annual RSL Anzac Day and Legacy Week Appeals, other events are supported.

DEFENCE AID TO THE CIVIL COMMUNITY

Edinburgh Defence Precinct units and personnel provide important emergency support in response to requests for assistance from the South Australian Government. In recent years, personnel have been deployed in South Australia in support of bushfires assistance, flood relief and the COVID-19 pandemic.

SUPPORTING COMMUNITY EVENTS

Having the major Defence presence in South Australia, the Edinburgh Defence Precinct has an outstanding record for supporting community events and activities in various ways.

- Commemoration. While EDP ADF personnel participate as a priority for key national commemoration days such as Anzac Day and Remembrance Day, they also support various commemorations throughout the year. In recent years, Defence has supported the Centenary of Anzac (2014-2018), the Epic Flight Centenary (2019) and the Air Force Centenary (2021).
- Major Events. EDP staff support major events and activities in the Adelaide area. In recent years, Defence has supported events such as the Adelaide 500, State Parliament openings and Australia Day. Such support is important to the success of the event as well as promoting the ADF and supporting our local community.

WOMEN'S AND CHILDREN'S **HOSPITAL / STARLIGHT FOUNDATION**

RAAF and Army members visit the Women's and Children's Hospital through the Starlight Foundation and the Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation to help children in hospital.

STEM ENGAGEMENT

Defence recognises the value in supporting and promoting science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) within the community, given its importance to Defence, and provides student STEM opportunities for young people to experience and be inspired by STEM in Defence.

SOUTH AUSTRALIAN AVIATION MUSEUM



Located at Port Adelaide, the South Australian Aviation Museum Inc (SAAM) is a not-for profit volunteer organisation dedicated

to the preservation of South Australian aviation. A key focus is on South Australia's military aviation story and the museum has a large collection of RAAF aircraft that have a connection with RAAF Edinburgh, including an F/A-18 Hornet (ARDU), F-111C (ARDU), Mirage (ARDU), AP-3C Orion (92WG) and PC-9 (ARDU). The museum is restoring a former RAAF Fairy Battle and Avro Anson aircraft.

SAAM provides a friendly atmosphere where those interested in aviation can donate their time and expertise in areas such as restoration, display, administration and research. Current and ex-serving RAAF members are particularly valuable to SAAM given their skills, knowledge and passion for military aviation and many volunteer their time at the museum.

The SAAM Foundation is an incorporated charitable trust through which financial donations to the museum may be directed and funds distributed. Donations to the SAAM Foundation are tax deductible.

SAAM is open from 10am to 4pm every day except Christmas Day. Adults \$15, concession \$10.50, family \$36 (two adults and three children), children (five-15 years) \$7.50, children (under five years) free.

PROMOTING MILITARY AVIATION **HERITAGE**

OUTH AUSTRALIA HAS A PROUD HISTORY of military aviation and was at the forefront of aviation development even before World War I, with South Australian aviation pioneers experimenting with simple machines.

During WWI, almost 350 South Australians served in the Royal Flying Corps or the Australian Flying Corps.

Between the wars, Moonta boy Sir Richard Williams demonstrated immense political prowess in fighting for the establishment and development of the RAAF between the wars to become the 'Father of the Air Force' and the most significant figure in its history.

In South Australia, three major airbases were established at Mt Gambier, Port Pirie and Mallala to train thousands of aircrew for the Empire Air Training Scheme. War graves at the three towns are testimony to the inherent dangers of pilot training with more than 85 perishing in training accidents in SA.

No.4 Initial Training School at Victor Harbor

conducted basic training for South Australians while various support units were established across Adelaide. A basic flight training school and No.34 Squadron was formed at and operated from Parafield, No.86 Squadron, a Kittyhawk squadron that served with distinction in New Guinea, was formed at Gawler. There were radar sites on the Fleurieu Peninsula and Wedge Island. More than 25,000 South Australians enlisted in the RAAF during World War II, serving across the globe in North Africa, the Middle East, Europe, Southeast Asia. the Pacific and Australia.

RAAF Edinburgh works closely with the South Australian community in promoting military aviation heritage. In recent years, the base has collaborated with the community on major projects such as the Epic Flight Centenary, the Air Force Centenary and the RAAF Edinburgh Airshow (2019). In particular, it works with organisations such as Air Force Association (SA), South Australian Aviation Museum and Heritage Trust of South Australia on preserving and promoting military aviation heritage.





IN THE ADELAIDE AREA,

RAAF Edinburgh, Defence Science and Technology East and Edinburgh Parks are located on traditional Kaurna land. In the Woomera region, there

are a number of primary Indigenous groups who are recognised as being the traditional owners.

INDIGENOUS LIAISON OFFICER

FLGOFF Jason Enchong, a proud Torres Strait Islander and Maori descendant, is the ILO for the Edinburgh Defence Precinct.

"I have had the privilege of being involved in this cultural space for a number of years throughout my 16 year Defence career. My passion for culture, community, reconciliation and diversity lead me to transfer from the Australian Army to the RAAF to conduct the ILO role, making culture and its contribution my full-time job, priority and focus. The RAAF, in my opinion, is leading the way in culture and diversity and I am honoured to be in a position to guide, strengthen, celebrate and positively influence our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders and the future generations of our ADF".

FLGOFF Enchong aims to enhance RAAF

Edinburgh's Indigenous cultural awareness, educate Commanders on cultural knowledge and assist with cultural decision-making surrounding Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Aviators. FLGOFF Enchong's first initiative is to attend Unit Induction Training to introduce himself, promote diversity, respect and an inclusive workforce, create new relationships and further strengthen current relationships.

CULTURAL INITIATIVES

Our Place, Our Skies: Air Force's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Strategy is the Air Force strategy that outlines initiatives to increase Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander contribution within Air Force, and develop understanding about connections to people and place, history and culture, spirit and belonging.

KEEPING PLACE

The RAAF Edinburgh Keeping Place is the latest Defence Indigenous initiative with Kaurna and the broader local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community. Developed through major collaboration with Kaurna Custodians, the it is designed to be the central meeting place on base for our Defence and broader Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities to come together for ceremony, education, kinship and heritage. The Keeping Place comprises of six key areas: a welcome area which displays information about the space and includes a scarred tree; an education space; a yarning circle; an Indigenous war memorial with silhouettes of members from RAAF Edinburgh; and two ceremonial spaces, one for men's and one for women's business.

NATIONAL RECONCILIATION & NAIDOC WEEKS

National Reconciliation Week (NRW) 2024 commenced with cultural training conducted by external company Kuma Kaaru. It was attended by wide variety of ranks from both ADF and APS staff. An Aboriginal art workshop was conducted inside the OR's Mess Ante Room, which saw ADF members from base come together to create two 2m by 1m silk canvas pieces. These will be hung up on base for public display. FLGOFF Enchong provided a brief to visiting Defence attachés, explaining the soon-to-be-opened Keeping Place. Wrapping NRW 2024 up was a commemorative service at Torrens Parade Ground with FLTLT Steven Warrior providing the Welcome To Country, painted in traditional ochre.

NAIDOC week started off with keynote speeches on DST-G with Jack Buckskin and FLGOFF Enchong providing some insight to their story and growing up as young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders. RAAF Edinburgh Mess offered a lunchtime service with all food coming from Indigenous ingredients. The Keeping Place Dedication closed NAIDOC week activities on base.

INDIGENOUS YOUTH & SCHOOLS ENGAGEMENT

In 2024, a number of school groups and organisations were hosted on RAAF Base EDN. The tours ranged from unit briefs, base tours to sports activities with the 24SQN PTI's. Through the volunteering of base members, this has been a big success with these organisations looking at continuing the relationship and doing more activities on base in the future.

RAAF EDN ILO has worked alongside DFR's Specialist Recruiting Team Indigenous and Defence Work Experience Program to build relationships with the local community, guiding and mentoring the younger and upcoming generation. RAAF hosted an Indigenous Youth Program, a combined effort with Defence Work Experience that saw young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders experience "a day in the life of a serving member". The group participated in PT, attended multiple units getting exposure to a wide range of opportunities that the RAAF and ADF can provide.

REGIONAL COMPLIANCE OFFICERS

The Regional Compliance Officer (RCO) program is a CAF-endorsed Indigenous Specialist Reserve initiative designed to enhance Defence's relationship with the Indigenous groups whose traditional lands form part of the Woomera Prohibited Area (WPA) and to provide employment and skilling opportunities to aboriginal people while maintaining connection with Country. Thus far, participants have come from the Kokatha Mula Nation, Antakirinja Matu-Yankunytjatjara,

Maralinga Tjarutja, Arabana and Anangu Pitiantiatiara Yankunytiatiara. RCOs are employed in the Air Force as uniformed members. In 2020. the first RCO reservist successfully transferred to the Permanent Air Force demonstrating how the program can lead indigenous members into a career in the Air Force.

WOOMERA INDIGENOUS ENGAGEMENT

The WPA encompasses the traditional lands of the Arabana, Gawler Ranges, Kokatha, Maralinga Tjarutja, Antakirinja Matu-Yankunytjatjara and Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara people. Defence acknowledges connection with country, culture and language with respect to the traditional custodians of these lands. EDP units engage, develop and foster an enduring and positive relationship with the various groups in the spirit of coexistence. ADF staff meet regularly with representative groups in both formal and informal capacities. In 2019, the Maralinga Tjarutja (MT) People and Defence entered into a formal agreement, known as the 'Cooperation Agreement' providing a framework for cooperation, outlines mutual rights and responsibilities. It also articulates how Defence and Maralinga Tjarutja representatives will engage with each other on a regular basis to manage safety and security within the WPA and work together to protect Aboriginal heritage and culture.

UPCOMING INITIATIVES

Through base engagement with ILO induction training and EDN SELT team, using the Keeping Place to host meetings/visits/engagements is being implemented. It will also be used for monthly Yarn Sessions for anyone and everyone to come

down and talk. This is currently on the first Friday of each month.

RAAF Edinburgh hosts a number of federal visits throughout the year. These visits are an important network between the members of RAAF EDN and the local/state governments. These visits are often started at the Keeping Place, introducing MPs to the base and its cultural hub.

Here on RAAF EDN we have an Aboriginal burial site, the remains of a Kaurna person were found in 2012 by a separate project, not far from the current AIR555 site. Landscaping was incomplete and unable to be maintained. AIR555 became aware and, through consultation with Kaurna over a location for the Keeping Place, was able undertake improvements to the site.

This site can be visited, however please do so appropriately, and culturally respectful without disturbing the site. No photography is permitted in this space.

The operating squadrons at Edinburgh cannot carry out their functions without the support of industry partners. That support includes aircraft maintenance and essential services to operate the airfield infrastructure. Some of the partners you may encounter on base are outlined here.

AIRBUS

With more than 800 employees across eight locations in Australia, Airbus supports aircraft for the ADF with maintenance, repair and overhaul centres for military fixed-wing and rotary wing aircraft.

Airbus has an enduring presence at RAAF Base Edinburgh, with a long-standing relationship with the RAAF supporting the P-3C Orion, the P-8A Poseidon, the MC-55 Peregrine and the MQ-4C Triton. Airbus is a strategic partner for the ADF and delivers extensive fixed-wing air services to the RAAF. These services include intermediate level maintenance, repair and modifications, publication support, delegated engineering authority, material supply and logistical services as well as surge support at the operational bases.

Airbus is also the common services provider for the intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR) enterprise at RAAF Edinburgh. The introduction into service of the MC-55A Peregrine

and MQ-4C Triton programs, as well as the commencement of the P-8A Poseidon capability assurance and deeper maintenance activities, result in increased pressures on skilled workforce shortages in the industry. The introduction of a number of common services is not only a strategic imperative to meet the operational requirements for ISR capabilities at RAAF Edinburgh, but also an opportunity to optimise existing resources, enhance interoperability and foster innovation.

ROLLS-ROYCE

Rolls-Royce is extremely proud to have powered the Australian Defence Forces for the past 100 years. The relationship began with the Rolls-Royce Eagle 8 engine fitted to the Fairey IIID in service with the Royal Australian Navy in 1920 and the RAAF in 1921.

The Peregrine and Triton aircraft that will be supported from RAAF Edinburgh are powered by Rolls-Royce engines; the BR710 in the Peregrine

and the Rolls-Royce AE 3007H in the Triton.

As a long-term partner of the Australian Defence Forces, Rolls-Royce is committed to strengthening Australia's military capability to support the security and stability of the Commonwealth of Australia.

NORTHROP GRUMMAN

Working alongside RAAF, Northrop Grumman Australia (NGA) delivers long-term aviation maintenance support for KC-30A Multi-Role Tanker Transport, C-27J Spartan and Special Purpose Aircraft fleets and provides sustainment services at its Electronic Sustainment Centre.

NGA expanded its presence at Edinburgh in preparation for the arrival of the MQ-4C Triton unmanned aircraft system, and will collaborate in the sustainment and maintenance of new capabilities at RAAF Edinburgh, In 2021, NGA delivered the Triton Network Integration Test Environment (NITE) to assist the Chief Information Officer Group to configure and test the array of Triton network interfaces and systems prior to the delivery of the first aircraft to Australia in 2024.



The Edinburgh Defence Precinct works in partnership with those organisations by supporting, promoting and assisting them to deliver the support our serving and ex-serving veterans need and value.

Commemorations are a key support activity for EDP units where we work with community partners in commemorating those who have served in the defence of our nation and its national interests. In doing so, we acknowledge our role in recognising those sacrifices and embracing the legacy that those who have served before us have passed onto us and the stewardship of today's ADF. While our members participate as a priority in key national commemoration events such as ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day, they also support a variety of commemorations throughout the year. For example, RAAF elements are proud to partner with the Air Force Association (South Australia Division) in holding the annual Air Force Birthday, Bomber Command and Battle of Britain Commemoration Services at the Air Force Memorial, Torrens Parade Ground, Adelaide. EDP Defence members work closely with veteran's organisations at all levels.

Federal organisations. We work closely with DVA and Open Arms to better connect those organisations with serving members and assist them in better understanding members needs.

State organisations. We work with Veterans SA on state veterans issues and commemoration activities and haverepresentatives on the State Veteran's Advisory Council contributing to improved initiatives and support for our veteran communities.

Defence members. Our Defence members are encouraged to be, and gain much benefit from being, a member of a veterans' organisation and contributing to its work. Defence members can bring great skills, experience, knowledge and particularly understanding to these organisations.

DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS

The Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) is an Australian Government agency providing support for veterans and their families. The department's services and supports include:

- pensions and compensation
- funding for health care
- rehabilitation
- counsellina
- support with returning to civilian life
- commemorative and community grants
- home-care assistance
- social health programs
- subsidised loans for housing and other housingrelated benefits
- commemorative activities and historical information.

DVA has been supporting the veteran community in Australia since the end of World War I, more than 100 years ago. Today, the government invests more than \$11.5 billion each year to support veterans and families.

The department's services and supports are continually evolving to ensure that DVA looks after veterans, not just during their service, but through their transition into civilian life, and beyond. If you have served this country, we are here to help you.

Veterans' recognition. Veterans and reservists can apply for the Veterans' Recognition Program as part of the Australian Defence Veterans' Covenant to recognise and acknowledge the unique nature of military service, and the contribution of veterans and their families. Applicants can receive the Veteran Card, Lapel Pin and Oath as recognition of their service. The Veteran Card is a redesign of the existing DVA Health Cards. While the Veteran Card's primary purpose continues to be providing health and treatment services to veterans, it also provides card holders with access to thousands of offers from businesses across Australia as part of a new benefits program. Eligible current and former serving members of the ADF, including reservists, can register for the Veterans' Recognition Program through their MyService account.

Mental health support. DVA has a strong focus on mental health treatment. Under a program called Non-Liability Health Care (or NLHC), DVA

funds treatment for all mental health conditions, whether related to service or not, for those with at least one day of continuous full-time service in the ADF, as well as eligible reservists. For further information visit dva.gov.au/health-andtreatment/injury-or-health-treatments.

In addition, mental health support including free and confidential counselling is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week through Open Arms (see page 34 for details).

Finding employment after the ADF. The Prime Minister's National Veterans' Employment Program provides resources to help transitioning ADF personnel navigate the civilian employment environment. Resources include the Veterans' Employment Toolkit, which been developed to help veterans prepare for the next step in their career. It contains information on translating your military skills into language civilian employers understand and advice on adjusting to the civilian workplace. It also includes useful tips to help with planning your transition and searching for job opportunities, as well as practical advice for writing a resume and preparing for an interview. Find the toolkit at veteransemployment.gov.au/veterans/ plan-your-transition.

While the Program does not advertise job vacancies, as of September 2022, there are more than 950 organisations from across Australia that have signed the Veterans' Employment Commitment declaring themselves to be 'veteranfriendly employers'. All organisations are listed on the website and can be searched for by 'state' and 'industry'. To find job opportunities visit the government's Workforce Australia website (workforceaustralia.gov.au). There is an optional 'Defence Force experience desirable' setting in the 'Advanced Search' function, to help veterans connect with employers.

Veteran Health Check, Transitioning can be a busy and challenging time for veterans and their families. There are many competing priorities to sort out - from planning a move, finding a new home, new schools and a new job. Your health can often be forgotten. DVA understands these challenges and is committed to providing veterans with easier access to health care, particularly in times of crisis. All ADF members who transition on or after 1 July 2019, and served at least one day of continuous full-time service, can access a comprehensive fully funded health assessment from their GP each year for the first five years following transition.

The Veteran Health Check is specifically designed for veterans and can be accessed through your community or family GP. It can assist you and your GP to identify and support the onset of physical and mental health conditions that are common in the years following transition and organise for early and targeted referrals. Your GP may also make referrals for additional tests, treatment or assessment by other health professionals, and can refer you to relevant DVA services or programs. You will need your DVA Health Card to access the annual Veteran Health Check. Make sure to check that your GP accepts DVA Health Cards when making an appointment.

If you transitioned from the ADF prior to 1 July 2019, you can still access a one-off comprehensive Veteran Health Check (also known as the One-off ADF post-discharge health assessment) from your GP at any time after you transitioned.

Connect with DVA online. DVA's online portal, MyService enables you to manage your business with DVA quickly and easily online. Through MyService you can keep your details up to date, submit claims and view a digital version of your Veteran Card. For more information or to register for MyService visit dva.gov.au/myservice.

On base support. DVA Veteran Support Officers (VSOs) visit more than 56 ADF bases nationally and offer members information and advice about the support and entitlements they might be able to receive through DVA. The support ranges from information on MyService through to instructions on how to submit a claim while you are still enlisted. VSOs are DVA staff – they are not Defence employees. The Edinburgh Veteran Support Office is located with Base Services at building 304. OPEN ARMS

Open Arms is Australia's leading national provider of mental health and wellbeing support to former and current

Australia Defence Force personnel and their families. Its workforce has an understanding of the unique nature of military service and the issues that face the military community - many are veterans themselves.

To better serve the Edinburgh Defence Precinct community, Open Arms has an established office at the Elizabeth City Centre. A second office is located in Eastwood, just south of the Adelaide CBD and adjacent to the Jamie Larcombe Centre, Veterans Mental Health Precinct. In addition, services are also provided out of the Veterans' and Families' Hub, Daw Park. A regional northern circuit sees a counsellor visiting Port Augusta, Port Pirie and Whyalla on a monthly basis. Open Arms has increased its mental health support offerings with the introduction of lived experience peers who work with veterans, family supports, community agencies and mental-health clinicians to provide a more holistic client-centred experience. They have also expanded their telehealth capability with the new HealthDirect platform for online video and voice counselling by in-centre clinicians. HealthDirect was chosen because it is user-friendly and has Australian Government security accreditation.

With an increased focus on the lifetime wellbeing of veterans, Open Arms continues to expand its services with eMental Health products and applications. This means you can access information on fitness, nutrition, sleep, social connections and much more all through Open Arms self-help menu at openarms.gov.au.

There are also resources on resilience, safety and PTSD available via mobile apps: High Res, PTSD Coach and On Track with The Right Mix. If you, or a family member, need support or want to find out more about Open Arms, call 1800 011 046 or visit openarms.gov.au.

VETERANS SOUTH AUSTRALIA

Veterans SA is the South Australian Government agency that leads advocacy across state government for matters affecting current and former serving ADF members and their families. It regularly consults with current and former serving members and their families, Defence networks and ex-service organisations to ascertain the needs of the community, while facilitating connection between traditional and non-traditional veteran providers to meet these unique needs.

The agency is committed to empowering current and former serving members and their spouses and children to build a confident and forward-thinking community. It strives to improve the broader community's understanding of the unique nature of service and the valuable skills and experience that those who have served in the ADF, and their families, can offer workplaces and communities in South Australia.

The agency has developed a detailed strategic plan to clearly identify its priority areas to improve the lives of veteran and Defence families living in South Australia. Focus areas include family support, career pathways for former-serving members and partners, in-school support for Defence and veteran children and regional support.

Veterans SA also supports the Veterans' Advisory Council, which is appointed by the Minister for Veterans' Affairs to provide independent advice on matters of concern to the veteran community in South Australia. The council meets regularly and represents a diverse range of experiences within the veteran community, including senior representatives from the Royal Australian Navy, Australian Army and Royal Australian Air Force.

Veterans SA also plays a key role in sharing information about services, programs and opportunities available in South Australia to those who have served in the ADF and their families.



















DEFENCE **SUPPORT**

Defence offers a range of programs and services to help Australian Defence Force members and their families make the most of the opportunities and challenges of military life.

EFENCE FAMILIES MAKE a significant contribution to the wellbeing of our Australian Defence Force (ADF) members and the success of their missions. In support of our ADF families, Defence Member and Family Support (DMFS) has a wide range of information and support for families to help them navigate military life.

DMFS delivers national programs and services to ADF families across Australia. There's support available at every stage, from the support for new recruits and their families adjusting to Defence life to partners and children managing the challenges of military life, to the time when a member transitions from permanent service.

Support available from DMFS includes assistance for partners' employment, help with finding childcare, deployment support, assistance for dependants with special needs, social worker support, relocation, support for community

groups, help for families during crisis and emergency, and education support for children. DMFS also holds a number of information sessions and social events throughout the year for military families in the region.

YOUR LOCAL DMFS TEAM

The local DMFS team is made up of military and civilian staff, undertaking a variety of roles including military support, social work, family liaison and education support.

The team provides a range of services to families across the region, including:

support in times of crisis

- deployment and absence support
- mobility and relocation support
- professional counselling for personal, relationship and family problems
- information sessions, social or support groups
- local education advice and assistance
- special needs recognition and review
- partner employment assistance
- finding childcare.

WHO CAN YOU MEET AT THE LOCAL OFFICE?

- Defence social workers are qualified professionals who are knowledgeable about the ADF and the military lifestyle.
- Family liaison officers have extensive knowledge of the region and can help families connect with local community groups and support services. They are also proactive in organising a range of information sessions and social events.
- Education liaison officers provide information and support to families around children's education and schools in the area.

DMFS PROGRAMS & SERVICES

24-HOUR SUPPORT

If you need support, help, or advice at any time, contact the Defence Member and Family Helpline on 1800 624 608. The Helpline operates 24-hours a day, seven days a week and is staffed by qualified human services professionals, including social workers and psychologists.

PARTNER EMPLOYMENT

The Partner Employment Assistance Program provides funding for initiatives to assist ADF partners with employment when they are relocated on posting, or if their ADF member is medically transitioning, and for some reregistration costs. Partners have the flexibility of opting to receive services from Defence's professional employment services provider or a provider of their choice.

FAMILIES WITH SPECIAL NEEDS

Families who have recognised family members with special needs can get information and practical assistance to reduce the impact of relocation.

SUPPORT DURING DEPLOYMENT AND TIME APART

DMFS provides a range of services, practical assistance and products to help inform and prepare ADF members and families for every stage of deployment. Support includes advice and referral to local support services, access to resilience programs, assistance in emergencies and crisis, and connection to community groups. Families can also opt in to receive regular deployment support calls by registering with the Defence Member and Family Helpline on 1800 624 608.

CHILDREN'S EDUCATION

DMFS has dedicated education liaison officers to provide advice to families and funds Defence School Mentors to support Defence children through changing schools and parental absence.

ACCESS TO CHILDCARE

DMFS maintains a network of childcare centres around Australia, with priority placement for ADF families. Families who are facing difficulties accessing childcare, such as when they move to a new area or change their work or care arrangements, can also access an individual case management service to help them find registered childcare services in their local community.

EMERGENCY AND CRISIS SUPPORT

DMFS provides a range of practical and emotional support programs for families facing emergency or crisis, including assistance in time of illness, injury, domestic crisis or bereavement. Members and their families can access 24-hour support, social work and assessment, or referral from the all-hours Defence Member and Family Helpline.

TRANSITION TO CIVILIAN LIFE

Joint Transition Authority delivers support to members and their families transitioning to Reserves Service or separating from the ADF. There is a range of support programs to assist ADF members and their families when they transition to civilian life, enabled by a transition coach. The coach helps to build a personalised package of support based on the circumstances and post-transition goals of the member and their family. The coach remains with the member and their family for up to two years post-transition. For more information, please email transition.sa@defence.gov.au.



SUPPORT FOR RESERVISTS

The families of Reserve members can access a broad range of support services when the Reservist is on continuous full-time service or away on deployment or exercise.



OVING HOUSE CAN be both an exciting and daunting prospect - some big decisions need to be made, the most important one being where you are going to live. Children's education, distance to work for both the member and spouse/ partner, health care, lifestyle preferences and the amenity of available housing are all factors to be considered.

SERVICE RESIDENCES

Unless you own a suitable home in your new posting locality, your first port of call is Defence Housing Australia (DHA). DHA provides housing and related services for Australian Defence Force members and their families through its portfolio of service residences (SR). DHA's portfolio comprises modern houses, townhouses and apartments in selected locations. The majority are off-base, integrated throughout the local community and in reasonably close proximity to Defence bases and establishments, amenities and services. DHA maintains the currency of its portfolio by upgrading existing properties, sourcing new properties through a variety of construction activities, acquiring properties

through traditional real estate markets and directly sourcing and leasing properties from private owners. You are eligible for a SR if you fit into any of these groups:

- You have a spouse, recognised interdependent partner or children who live with you (Accompanied Resident Family)
- You have Recognised Other Persons who normally live with you
- You are a member with unaccompanied resident family and your dependants need housing (Unaccompanied Resident Family).

More detailed information on entitlements can be found in the Pay and Conditions Manual, Chapter 7, pay-conditions.defence.gov.au/ pacman/chapter-7, and/or on DHA's website dha.qov.au.

SINGLES

DHA also holds some apartments suitable for single members – called Members Choice accommodation. The process for accessing Members Choice or private rental under Rent Allowance (RA) is the same as for families accessing SR, outlined below.

HOW DO I FIND A SERVICE RESIDENCE?

As soon as you know you require a Service Residence, call DHA on 139 342 to obtain a username and password to access Online Services, a unique online tool that will allow you to select your new home. Online Services will show you:

- Homes within your entitlement
- Interior and exterior photos of the homes
- Property details for each home
- A floor plan
- A map showing the location of the home and nearby facilities.

Once you have researched your options, you can reserve a home on Online Services.

Note that, whether you are an Accompanied Resident Family or a single, if you own a home in your current posting location which is suitable for you to live in, you will not be eligible for a SR or RA.

PRIVATE RENTAL

If DHA cannot provide you with a suitable SR, you may be eligible for RA. While DHA will manage your RA application, it is up to you to find a suitable rental property. Rental properties in the region can be sourced from local real estate agencies or on any of the following commercial websites:

- realestate.com.au/rent
- domain.com.au/rent
- rent.com.au
- property.com.au/sa/rent

BUYING A HOUSE

You may feel it's time to enter the housing market or wish to sell your home in your losing locality and purchase in the gaining locality. Assistance for home purchase may be available through:

- The Defence Home Ownership Assistance Scheme pays a monthly subsidy on a member's home loan interest. The scheme is administered by the Department of Veterans' Affairs, for details see dhoas.gov.au.
- The Home Purchase or Sale Expenses Allowance reimburses reasonable buying and selling costs. For details see the Pay and Conditions Manual, pay-conditions.defence. qov.au/pacman/chapter-7/part-3.

Note that a decision to purchase your own home in your new locality does not need

to be made before you proceed on posting, you can decide at any time during your posting. However, if you are in RA accommodation, you will need to consider the penalties in your lease for early termination.

POSTING CONNECT

PostingConnect provides an online environment from where you can manage your posting. The including Toll and DHA, and is accessible from any device. ADF MEMBER HEALTH

Defence provides essential healthcare to all ADF members, on and off base, including medical and dental, mental health, ambulance transport and hospitalisation. ADF members do not need a Medicare card.

24-HOUR HEALTH SUPPORT

ADF members needing urgent medical treatment when away from base should call 1800 IM SICK (1800 467 425). The IM SICK line is a toll-free, all-hours service for ADF personnel to discuss health concerns over the phone and receive immediate advice on where they need to go to receive appropriate treatment. The service is provided by BUPA under the ADF Health Services Contract.

RECOGNISED DEPENDENTS

Members need to make arrangements for the health care of their families, but note

that financial assistance is available (see under: DEFENCE FAMILY HEALTH CARE).

FINDING A GP

To find a GP in your locality, a good place to start is the 'find a health service' tool on the Australian Government's Health Direct website. healthdirect. gov.au/australian-health-services, which allows you to filter out GPs who don't bulk bill. GPs who don't bulk bill will charge you for the visit. You can claim the 'schedule fee' from Medicare, but it will probably be less than the GP's account, leaving a residual cost. Many doctors now offer a service called HICAPS that allows you to claim your Medicare rebate when you pay at the doctor's surgery. Joining a social group to connect with others in your area is also good way to glean advice on local GPs and medical centres.

DEFENCE FAMILY HEALTH CARE

The National ADF Family Health Program will reimburse dependants of ADF members for out-ofpocket expenses for all GP visits. Specialist services will also be reimbursed, up to a total allocation of \$800 per dependent which can be shared between dependents. PRIVATE HEALTH INSURANCE

Medicare makes adequate provision to cover all Australian citizens for their essential health needs. However. Medicare doesn't cover many 'extras' such as ambulance services, most dental services, spectacles, contact lenses, hearing aids and cosmetic surgery. You may choose to take out private health insurance to provide your family with a wider range of options and more comprehensive cover. Health insurance policies can be either hospital or general treatment (extras) or a combination of both. Your decision to purchase private insurance is a personal one and will be based on a number of factors:

- The advantages of having more choices, for instance the ability to choose your surgeon/obstetrician/specialist and the hospital you prefer from the private health insurer's agreed providers
- The probability of obtaining treatment faster than you might do on a public hospital waiting list
- Your desire to be covered for the extras
- The cost of private health cover for different options that are offered by the numerous providers in the health-insurance market.

With respect to the cost, you will also need to consider the tax implications of the Medicare Levy surcharge, which (as distinct from the Medicare Levy) is an additional tax imposed on those with a taxable income above a certain threshold who do not have a prescribed level of private health insurance.

The cost of your private health insurance policy will also be influenced by your age when you commence your policy. Once you turn 31, a Lifetime Health Cover (LHC) loading of two percent is added to your hospital cover premium for every year you're without hospital cover, e.g. if you delay until age 40, your LHC would be 20 percent. Note that permanent ADF members are considered to have had private hospital cover while serving.

CARING FOR **FAMILIES**

The Women's and Children's Hospital Network is South Australia's primary deliverer of specialist women's and children's health

T IS IMPORTANT for Defence members to have a trusted and valued hospital that can provide for their families while they are posted to Adelaide.

The Women's and Children's Hospital (WCH) is South Australia's leading provider of specialist care for children and the state's largest maternity and obstetric service. It is part of the broader Women's and Children's Health Network (WCHN) which provides statewide services from more than 150 sites.

The WCH provides acute and outpatient care in areas such as paediatric medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynaecology, neonatology, mental health, aboriginal health, disability, rehabilitation and allied health. The hospital has a purpose-built unit for the Aboriginal Family Birthing Program, which complements its existing maternity services while providing a culturally appropriate space for Aboriginal families.

The WCHN is committed to ensuring people understand what is happening to them when they visit, and to the principles of person- and familycentred care which involves:

- Ensuring consumers are equipped to give informed consent to receiving health services.
- Promoting shared decision-making in healthcare or birthing experience.
- Providing access to accurate information in a format that is comfortable and meaningful.
- Helping with orientation to the ward, unit or service being accessed.
- Treating people with dignity and respect. The Women's and Children's Hospital is

currently located in North Adelaide's picturesque parklands, but planning is underway for a new Women's and Children's Hospital, to be built in the South Australian Biomedical precinct close to the Royal Adelaide Hospital.

While those plans are brought to fruition, the WCH is continually updating its services, with recently refurbished areas including a new child and adolescent mental health ward, neonatal nurseries, upgraded paediatric emergency

department, operating theatres and adolescent ward. Further work is underway to upgrade the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit, where the most unwell children are cared for.

The WCH also has a Virtual Urgent Care Service which offers access to timely medical care, potentially reducing the need to visit the emergency department. The service is staffed by highly skilled paediatric emergency nurses and doctors who will assess your child and provide advice or referral to an appropriate service for ongoing care. You can access it by visiting wch. sa.gov.au/virtualurgentcare.

There is also a new virtual care service being trialled for women experiencing early pregnancy loss or gynaecological issues. Search "Virtual Women's Assessment Service, WCH" on your web browser to access the service.

EARLY **LEARNING**

Choosing the right childcare or early learning service will depend on your family's needs and where you and your child will feel most comfortable.

S WELL AS PROVIDING CARE. childcare and early learning services provide an opportunity for your child to develop social, emotional and learning skills. A range of care and play-based learning options is available for babies and children up to six years of age. Some childcare providers also offer before- and after-school care to school-aged children. Childcare may be offered by private providers, community groups, government agencies, individuals, babysitters or nannies. When deciding what type of care is best for your child, you may want to ask yourself:

- How many hours of care do I need? The whole day, just mornings or afternoons, a few hours a week, or just occasionally.
- Do I want my child cared for in a home environment or in a centre?
- What kind of qualifications and experience do the staff members have?
- Does the service offer a preschool program?
- What learning and play opportunities do I want my child to have?
- What kind of routine will my child have?
- Do I want the service to provide lunch?
- Can I have a look at a sample meal plan?
- What is the carer-to-child ratio?
- Can I claim the Child Care Subsidy if I choose a certain childcare and learning service?

LONG DAY CARE

Generally available all day or on a part-time basis until children start school, long day care is offered by government, private, community or non-profit organisations. In most cases, it is provided at an early childhood centre, which may be called a childcare centre, early learning centre, kindergarten or preschool. Long day care may also be provided by a carer in your home - through a nanny or babysitting services or through the Family Day Care scheme in the carer's home. childcarefinder.gov.au

FAMILY DAY CARE

Family day care offers families affordable, personalised care by a qualified educator in a safe and nurturing home environment. It is small group care for a maximum of four children under school age and three children of school age.

The Department for Education has managed family day care for more than 40 years and is the longest-serving provider of family day care services in South Australia, with educators based across metropolitan and regional areas. Qualified educators are supported and monitored by a department qualified coordinator. Family day care offers care during work hours, before/after school, during school holidays, overnight and weekends.

Family day care benefits

- Smaller groups of children means strong, trusting relationships with one main educator
- Siblings can be cared for together in the same home
- Children will be in a home environment that will help them develop relationships that go from a young age through to primary school years
- Children with additional needs are welcomed into small, home-based care environments
- Children will be in an environment that supports play-based learning.
- Access to a formal childcare option that can operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week
- A choice of educators so parents can decide who best suits them and their child
- May be eligible for the Australian Government's Child Care Subsidy to assist with fees
- Educators can drop off and pick up your child to and from school or preschool.

Family day care educators:

• have a minimum qualification of Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and Care



- have regular police clearance checks for themselves and other occupants in their homes
- have current first aid and CPR
- run a service that complies with the National Quality Framework government standards and state requirements
- are supported by highly trained department Family day care coordinators who work at a local level and interact with children, educators and parents.

PRESCHOOL

In SA, preschools are also known as kindergartens and some private preschools are known as early learning centres. In preschool, children learn through play-based programs designed and delivered by qualified teachers.

Preschools may be run by government, private or community providers for children who will be starting school within the next year (four to five year olds).

If your child turns four before May 1, they can start preschool on the first day of Term 1 in that year. If your child turns four on or after May 1, they can start preschool on the first day of Term 1 the following year. Children usually attend up to four sessions per week for up to four terms. Preschools may be a stand-alone centre, part of a



school or located with another childcare service. See www.sa.gov.au/topics/education-andlearning/early-childhood-education-and-care/ preschool-and-kindergarten

OCCASIONAL CARE

Occasional Care offers professional care for children on a casual basis. In SA, it is generally offered through government preschools and in some childcare centres, preschools, family day care homes, nanny and babysitting services or through the In-home Care Program. This service is suitable for families who do not need childcare on a regular basis but would like someone to look after their children occasionally, for example when they have a medical or other appointment. With this type of care, you only pay for the hours you use. See education.sa.gov.au/parents-andfamilies/child-care-services

WAITING LISTS

Some childcare services use waiting lists to manage high demand and places are allocated to families with the greatest need for childcare. Where demand for childcare is high, all approved services with the exception of Occasional Care must adhere to Priority of Access Guidelines (available at dss.qov.au) to ensure there is a fair childcare system.

CHILD CARE SUBSIDY

The Australian Government provides families with financial assistance to help cover the costs of approved childcare, under the Child Care Subsidy. The Child Care Subsidy is income tested and is usually paid directly to approved Child Care Services to reduce the fees that eligible families pay. You can apply for the Child Care Subsidy online or in person through Centrelink. To apply online, visit the Services Australia website, servicesaustralia.gov.au.

RESPITE CARE

The SA Department of Education operates a Respite Care Program, a specialised disability care service for children and young people. It is a provider for the National Disability Insurance Scheme, which provides funding for respite care for children and young people with a disability. SOUTH AUSTRALIA'S **SCHOOL SYSTEM**

There is a lot to learn about how primary schools and high schools function – especially as different states have different arrangements. Here's some information on education in South Australia.

IN SOUTH AUSTRALIA you can choose to send your child to a government (public school), independent or Catholic school or preschool. It is compulsory for children to be enrolled in a school by their sixth birthday and the start date for school for all children is the first day of Term 1. All young people under the age of 17 years are required to attend full-time schooling, training or work for at least 25 hours a week.

PRIMARY SCHOOL

Government or public primary schools are coeducational. Most children attend four terms of preschool and four terms of reception.

South Australian primary schools traditionally cover the period from reception to Year 6, with Year 7 as the first year of high school.

Children usually attend a school near their home and those living within in the area or zone around the school have priority in enrolment. However, parents can send their children to another school if it has vacancies.

A number of public primary schools are on the same site as a high school and are generally known as R-12 schools (reception to Year 12). Some schools offer services from birth through to Year 12

In SA, public primary schools have one intake date. If your child turns five before May 1, they can start primary school the first day of Term 1 of that year. If your child turns five on or after May 1, they can start primary school the first day of Term 1 of the following year. Children must start at school by their sixth birthday.

FINDING A SCHOOL

Starting school is a major milestone for children and their families, so the decision you make about their education is important. The school finder tool on the SA Department for Education website (education.sa.gov.au) will help you find public primary schools in your area as well and provides zoning and other information.

To help you choose the best school for your child, look at the school websites for information about performance, mission, staffing, funding and resources. Request copies of annual reports, behaviour management policies and school rules. You can also get information and compare schools at the My School website (myschool.edu.au). Once you have a shortlist, make an appointment to meet the principal and staff and see the school facilities.

HIGH SCHOOL

From 2022, Year 6 became the last year of primary school in SA public schools and Year 7 the first year of high school, bringing South Australia in line with other states and territories, as well as other education systems in the state.

The transition to high school process is a registration of interest managed by the education department on behalf of schools. This process will allocate students to a high school, but is not an enrolment to the school. Final enrolment is subject to the consideration and acceptance by the high school. The central process is completed around the end of Term 2, and then high schools



will enrol students. If parents miss the transition process, they can contact a secondary school directly regarding enrolment.

Your child will be considered for placement at each school you have applied for, in order of choice. However, popular metropolitan high schools may offer placement for only a small number of non-local students.

If parents do not want their child to go to their allocated school, they can approach other schools directly. If there are available spaces, the school may accept a request for enrolment.

Parents can transfer their child to a South Australia public high school at any time during the year, if the new school is able to accommodate the request. Transfer enquires should be made directly with the school.

TRANSFERING TO A NEW SCHOOL

Speak to your child's current school about transferring to a new school. The principal can help you through the process. They will make sure the new school receives reports and other information to help them make the best arrangements for your child.

If you are moving from another state, the new school can request consent from you to obtain



your child's information from the previous school using the interstate student data transfer note. This system enables the new schools to support the educational placements of new students.

When changing schools:

- consider the timing of the move and if the move can coincide with the change of term
- involve your children in discussions and decisions about moving - this may help allay any fears or concerns they have
- discuss the forthcoming move with your current school and collect documentation outlining student achievement levels and education history - this will help with appropriate placement at the new school
- prepare a list of your children's particular needs, for example their preferred subjects, sporting and other interests, transport needs, and favourite extracurricular activities
- consider subject choices, special education provisions, transport to and from school,

- vocational education programs, and cultural and sporting opportunities
- consider behaviour management, discipline and uniform policies.

STARTING SCHOOL

Before starting school, children are usually invited to visit their new school so they can become familiar with it. If your child is transferring to a new school, the principal will have processes to help them adjust, such as buddy systems.

Even for students who are looking forward to it, a change in school may cause distress. Signs of stress include irritability, reluctance to talk, sleep disturbance, stomach aches, headaches and not wanting to go to school. The school can provide support and advice if your child is having difficulty settling in.

SENIOR YEARS

The Australian Curriculum is taught in government schools for reception to Year 10 subjects. The curriculum covers English, maths, science, humanities and social sciences, the arts, technologies, health and physical education and languages. Years 10 to 12 students study towards the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE). SACE provides pathways to work and further education with some subjects counting towards higher qualifications offered through vocational education and university, see sace.sa.edu.au. Students can choose to incorporate SACE studies with:

- vocational education and training (VET)
- a flexible learning option (FLO).

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

VET pathways allow students in Years 10-12 to develop skills and understanding for the workforce and get training in industry-specific skills. VET students can gain credit towards a nationally recognised qualification such as a certificate or diploma while undertaking their SACE and it may improve admission scores for those planning further study after school.



Five SACE credits are awarded for successful completion of 35 hours of VET. Up to 150 of the 200 credits required for SACE can be earned through VET. The remaining 50 credits must come from undertaking PLP (10 credits), English (20), Maths (10) and Research Project (10), as they are a compulsory requirement of completing SACE. Students should find out about different industries before choosing a VET course, see skills.sa.gov.au for more information.



FLEXIBLE LEARNING

FLO is a student enrolment strategy aimed to improve the engagement and retention of young people in secondary schools who are identified at significant risk of disengaging from a mainstream school-based learning program.

A FLO enrolment involves:

• undertaking of appropriate learning programs

(SACE, Australian Curriculum, VET)

- having a school-managed Flexible Learning and Transition Portfolio in place
- the provision of individual case management.



SUPPORT FOR **STUDENTS**

If you're keen to minimise any disruption to your child's education as a result of your family's relocation, talk to Defence Member and Family Support.

DEFENCE MEMBER AND FAMILY SUPPORT

(DMFS) provides information, resources and programs to help with the transition between schools and education systems when ADF members and their families move, and provides support for the unique needs of Defence children.

ADF EQUIP

The ADF Equip Program is designed to help children manage the challenges associated with Defence life. The program supports children to learn appropriate strategies to help them manage the challenge of parental absence and relocation related to service. It includes facilitated sessions tailored to age group and is open to children aged between five and 18 years.

EDUCATION LIAISON OFFICERS

Education liaison officers are experienced staff who help Defence families as they move around the country, providing information, advice, referral and specialised assistance. They are located in each state and territory and have extensive knowledge about the local schools and education systems as well as the challenges faced by Defence children. The assistance provided includes:

- Informing families about local schools and education systems
- Linking families with special education providers, resources or support agencies according to their children's individual needs (including special needs students)
- Working with schools to ensure a supportive education environment and to raise awareness of issues facing Defence children
- Informing families about Defence support services available, such as financial assistance under the Education Assistance Scheme.

DEFENCE SCHOOL MENTORS


DMFS's school mentor program provides support to the children of ADF members, particularly when moving in and out of a school on posting or when a parent is absent from home. Under the program, mentors in primary and secondary schools support Defence students transitioning from school to school and during times of parental absence. Mentors help schools, families and children to develop strategies to successfully integrate into the school and community. Their role also includes:

- Coordinating appropriate welcome and farewell activities
- Smoothing the transition between different schools and different education systems (including minimising the impact of relocation on learning outcomes)
- · Monitoring the social, emotional and academic wellbeing of Defence students
- Helping students develop self-confidence, self-reliance and resilience
- Referring students to services or school community programs that meet their needs.

Defence families can access a range of financial support to help minimise the disruption to caused by posting and relocations. The support available includes:

- Tutoring assistance
- Boarding school allowance
- Tertiary accommodation
- Students with special needs
- Reimbursement of a lost scholarship
- Reunion travel.

The aim is to provide students with educational stability or short-term assistance to help overcome any immediate difficulties with education or emotional wellbeing as a result of relocation.





LIFESTYLE

With world-class wine regions, city culture, beaches and rolling hills, there's plenty to explore around Edinburgh.

ADELAIDE

HETHER YOU'RE INTO FOOD AND DRINK, the arts, sport or heritage, central Adelaide has plenty to offer. Surrounded by parklands, the compact city is laid out in a neat grid, which makes it easy to navigate.

GETTING AROUND

From the Adelaide Railway Station, you can walk to most of the city's attractions and there is a free city loop bus (city connector) and free tram travel within the CBD (adelaidemetro.com.au). Explore the city with a variety of self-guided tours (www. experienceadelaide.com.au/visit/things-to-do/ city-trails/).

NORTH TERRACE

Stroll along tree-lined North Terrace to see many of the city's heritage buildings and cultural venues, including the Art Gallery of South Australia (artgallery.sa.gov.au), State Library (slsa.sa.gov.au), South Australian Museum (samuseum.sa.gov.au), Migration Museum (82 Kintore Avenue, migration.history.sa.gov. au) and the Centre of Democracy (www. centreofdemocracy.sa.gov.au).





BOTANIC GARDENS

In the heart of the city, the beautifully maintained gardens cover 50ha and include the largest single-span glasshouse in the Southern Hemisphere and the historic Palm House, imported from Germany in 1875. A range of masterclasses, concerts and seasonal events run throughout the year. North Terrace, Adelaide. Open daily. environment.sa.gov.au/ botanicgardens

ADELAIDE ZOO

Home to more than 2.500 animals and 250 species of exotic and native mammals, birds. reptiles and fish, the zoo covers eight hectares, bordered by the Botanic Park and River Torrens. Kids enjoy riding the iconic Popeye along the river to or from the zoo (thepopeye.com.au). The zoo offers a range of up-close animal experiences including giraffe feeding, tiger encounter and zoo keeper for a day. Frome Road, Adelaide. Open 9.30am-5pm daily. adelaidezoo.com.au

RUNDLE MALL

In the heart of Adelaide, the Rundle Mall Precinct is the place for fashion, food and shopping. Just to the south of North Terrace, it runs from King William Street to Pulteney Street around an open-air mall. Continue east along Rundle Street for boutique fashion, restaurants, cafes and pubs. rundlemall.com; rundlestreet.com.au

ADELAIDE CENTRAL MARKET

Established in 1869, the Adelaide Central Market is one of the largest covered markets in the Southern Hemisphere. More than 80 traders sell a huge range of local fresh food including fruit and vegetables, meat and poultry, seafood, cheese, bakery and small goods. ADELAIDE RIVERBANK

Covering 380ha around the River Torrens, the Adelaide Riverbank hosts world-class arts, cultural and sporting events and has a variety of walking, running and cycling trails. On the city side of the river, you'll find the Botanic Gardens and Botanic Park, the zoo, University of Adelaide, Torrens Parade Ground, Adelaide Festival Centre (adelaidefestivalcentre. com.au), SkyCity hotel and casino, Adelaide Convention Centre and Adelaide Railway Station. To the north sits the North Adelaide Golf Course (northadelaidegolf.com.au), Adelaide Oval (adelaideoval.com.au), which hosts sporting events and concerts and offers experiences from the RoofClimb to fine dining at the Oval Hotel, and The Drive tennis centre

(thedriveadelaide.com.au), home to the Adelaide International tennis tournament every summer (adelaideinternational.com.au).

EATING OUT

Adelaide is known for its award-winning restaurants and chefs. Some of the best places to grab a bite can be found on Gouger Street, Rundle Street and King William Road. Leigh Street, Peel Street and Ebenezer Place are small bar hotspots, with some of the coolest places tucked away in basements, behind secret doors and down unmarked alleyways. Every autumn the city hosts Tasting Australia (2-11 May 2025, tastingaustralia. com.au) one of the country's longest running eating and drinking festivals.

BEACHES

STRETCHED ALONG ST VINCENT GULF,

Adelaide has a wealth of beaches within easy reach (most are less than 30 minutes from the city centre).

The further up the gulf you go, the more protected the beaches, making them ideal for children. The metropolitan beaches are popular for windsurfing, kite surfing and paddle boarding. South of the city, the water is more open and there are some surf beaches.

Catch the tram from the centre of Adelaide to historic **Glenelg**, just 12km away, to enjoy the shops and cafes along Jetty Road and Holdfast Shores Marina or take the kids to The Beachhouse amusement centre

West Beach offers the added attraction of Australia's largest aerial challenge course (West Beach Adventure), while neighbouring Henley **Beach** has a wide sandy beach with cafes and restaurants around a grassed square.

Historic Semaphore has a long beach bordered by sand dunes and boulevards dotted with well-preserved art deco buildings.

The jetties at **Brighton**, Glenelg, Henley Beach and Semaphore are popular spots to fish for tommy ruff, salmon trout, mulloway, bream and squid. The Outer Harbour Breakwater is a good spot for snapper, tommy ruff, bream and garfish, and St Kilda, at the northern end of the Port River, is a good fishing spot for bream, vellowfin whiting, mullet, salmon trout and blue swimmer crabs. The SA Fishing app has information on fishing in South Australia, pir.sa.gov.au/fishing/recfishingapp

To the south of Adelaide, Port Noarlunga, Christies Beach and the beaches of the Fleurieu Peninsula are popular for surfing and body boarding.



NATURE & WILDLIFE

ADELAIDE DOLPHIN SANCTUARY

Home to more than 30 bottlenose dolphins, with another 400 dolphins visiting regularly, the sanctuary stretches from the Port River to Port Gawler and features a 10,000-year-old mangrove forest. Other wildlife includes stingrays, long-nosed fur seals and endangered Australian sea lions. environment.sa.gov.au/parks

ADELAIDE INTERNATIONAL **BIRD SANCTUARY**

Stretching along more than 60km of coastline north of Adelaide, the sanctuary is a crucial habitat on a migratory route used by more than five million birds a year. The sanctuary includes several boardwalks. environment.sa.gov.au/parks

CLELAND WILDLIFE PARK

Home to 130 species of Australian wildlife, the park is part of the Cleland Conservation Park. Most of the animals wander freely and visitors can feed them, get some great photos and even touch them. 365 Mount Lofty Summit Road, Crafers. clelandwildlifepark.sa.gov.au

MONARTO SAFARI PARK

About an hour southeast of Adelaide, the 1.500ha open-range zoo has more than 50 species of exotic and native animals. Explore on walking trails or the Zu-loop bus. 63 Monarto Road, Monarto. Open 9.30m-5pm daily. monartosafari.com.au

ST KILDA MANGROVE TRAIL

A 400m elevated boardwalk takes you through tidal salt marshes, mangroves and sea grass channels to a lookout across the Barker Inlet. Nearby St Kilda Adventure Playground has a flying fox, slides and a pirate ship. Cockle Street, St Kilda. Open 9am-4pm daily (except Christmas Day). discoversalisbury.com.au

HEYSEN TRAIL

The 1,200km Heysen Trail runs from Cape Jervis, about 100km southwest of Adelaide, north through the Adelaide Hills and Barossa Valley to Parachilna Gorge in the Flinders Ranges. Sections can be done as day walks, but many are closed during the bushfire season (November to April). heysentrail.asn.au

RAIL TRAILS

There are a number of shared-use paths on disused railway corridors, including The Barossa Trail (43km) between Tanunda and Angaston, The Riesling and Rattler Trail (54km) in the Clare Valley, the Coast to Vines Rail Trail (37km) between Marino Rocks and Willunga, the Outer Harbour Rail Trail (23km) in Port Adelaide, and the Penfield Rail Trail (7km) from Salisbury to Edinburgh North. railtrails.org.au

THE MURRAY RIVER

A bit over an hour's drive east from Edinburgh,

the Murray is SA's largest waterway and offers plenty of water activities. Take a cruise or hire a houseboat to explore at leisure. Paddle through backwaters, creeks and lagoons on one of the many dedicated kayak and canoe trails or, if walking or cycling is more your style, try a section of the 450km Murray Coorong Trail. themurrayriver.com

LOCAL TRAILS

Little Para River Trail (16.5km), runs from the escarpments to the east of Northern Adelaide to Barker Inlet in the west. Remnants of natural landscapes along the river include eucalyptus woodland and golden wattle. A mix of sealed

and unsealed trails link to the Dry Creek Trails. Dry Creek Trails (14km), a network of walking and cycling trails follows Dry Creek and its reserves from Wynn Vale and Valley View through Mawson Lakes to the Little Para River Trail.

Cobbler Creek, off the Groveway, Salisbury East, has a number of trails including Mia Tappa Circuit (2.4km), Babbler Loop (3.6km), Porosa Hike (3km), Valley Circuit (4.2km) and Mike Green Trail (3.3km).

Tapa Martinthi Yala shared-use path (16.7km) runs alongside the Northern Connector motorway. In the south, the path connects to the Port River Bikeway (7.6km). In the north, it connects to the Stuart O'Grady Bikeway (22.6km).

Wynn Vale to Valley View Walking Path (6.3km), a wide, shared-use path meanders along the Dry Creek corridor.

Smith Creek Trail (3km), a family-friendly path that winds from Smithfield Plains, near the train station, to Stebonheath Park at Andrews Farm.

Gawler Rivers Path (8km) follows the North and South Para Rivers, skirting the town centre.

NATIONAL WINE CENTRE OF AUSTRALIA

BAROSSA VALLEY

With more then 150 wineries and 90 cellar doors, the Barossa is home to the biggest names in Australian wine, including Penfolds (Grange) and Henschke (Hill of Grace), along with well-known labels such as Wolf Blass and Jacob's

Creek. Lyndoch, Tanunda, Nuriootpa and Angaston offer accommodation and restaurants, and many of the cellar doors have restaurants or serve food platters. Barossa Visitor Centre, 66-68 Murray Street, Tanunda.

CLARE VALLEY

Famous for its Riesling, Clare Valley also produces fine shiraz and cabernets, along with other varieties. It has some of SA's oldest wineries; Sevenhill Cellars was established in 1851. The valley stretches along a 40km corridor between Auburn and Clare and is home to more than 40 cellar doors, plus great pubs and cafes.

ADELAIDE HILLS

It is flanked by hills and beaches and has plenty of cafes, restaurants and markets. As the largest land-based weapon testing facility in the Western world, with a specialised operations environment in support of directed whole-of-Defence activities for the testing of war material, the Woomera Range Complex supports a wide variety of trials covering many Defence-related technologies, including ground-based weapons systems, explosive ordnance and hazardous materials, and specialised force preparation activities.

Woomera's remote location provides a unique working and living environment with the village's population growing and shrinking depending on the scale of activities being undertaken and thus offers Defence employees distinct opportunities not available at other Defence bases. As an open base, Woomera Village attracts a large number of tourists annually. The complex is undergoing a significant upgrade to its facilities and infrastructure which will impact capacity, availability and resident amenities. Please be patient throughout the associated works as the end result will benefit Woomera residents and range users. Enjoy your stay.

OOMERA. THE FOURTH

and the largest and most isolated of the Edinburgh Defence Precinct sites. is located approximately

450km north of Adelaide. Since its establishment on 1 April 1947, the Woomera Range has been known as the Woomera Rocket Range, Woomera Instrumented Range, the Woomera Test Facility and the Woomera Test Range. In July 2013, the entire facility was renamed Woomera Range Complex comprising Woomera Test Range (WTR) and RAAF Base Woomera, which includes the Woomera Village.

Operated by Air Force Test Ranges Squadron, the WTR is a highly specialised Defence 'test' range capability. Due to its specialist role, the WTR operates under separate Defence Force



Regulations, including special Federal legislation specifically guiding the use of Woomera for 'the testing of war materiel'.

RAAF Base Woomera (WMA) was established 15 January 2015 and directly supports the operation of the WTR.

Woomera Village, largely supported by Security and Estate Group, Department of Defence, manages the garrison support facilities for the Woomera Range Complex.

HISTORY OF THE WOOMERA RANGE COMPLEX

In April 1947, the Anglo-Australian Project was formally established heralding the immediate commencement of work to construct what was to become the world's largest, and one of its most secretive, military test sites during the Cold War period from the mid-1940s to the mid-1980s. Missile testing commenced in 1949.

During the height of the Cold War in the 1950s and 1960s, more than 6,000 people lived and worked at the Woomera Rocket Range. During that period, the range was one of the busiest rocket launching facilities in the Western world, and second only to Cape Canaveral in the USA for the number of annual rocket launches.

Weapons designed by the Joint Project and tested at Woomera include the Sea Wolf, Rapier, Sea Dart and Bloodhound surface-to-air missiles, the Black Knight research rocket, the Blue Steel nuclear stand-off missile, the Malkara anti-tank missile, the Ikara anti-submarine missile, and the GAF Jindivik target aircraft. Australia's first satellite, WRESAT, was launched from Woomera in 1967. The Joint Project ran until 1980.

The Woomera Rocket Range was renamed Woomera Instrumented Range on 1 March 1991 when the RAAF Aircraft and Research Development Unit became responsible for the management of what was, at the time, the only real remaining operational element of the 'old' range. From 2006 to 2008, the operational elements of the range were briefly known as the Woomera Test Facility. The entire complex was renamed on 1 July 2008 to Woomera Test Range, and on 1 July 2013, again changed to the Woomera Range Complex.

AIR FORCE TEST RANGES SQUADRON

Air Force Test Ranges Squadron (AFTRSQN) provides engineering, logistics, personnel capability, air movements, command and safety functions that supports flying operations at RAAF Base Woomera and is responsible for the management and day-to-day conduct of range activities across both Woomera, Delamere (Northern Territory) and other Air Weapons Ranges across Australia. Approximately 110 RAAF uniformed and civilian personnel make up AFTRSON with personnel located at RAAF Edinburgh, Woomera, Delamere and Amberley (Queensland). A mixed operations and technical services flight is on permanent detachment at the WTR complex to provide necessary support services, on-site liaison and management of range activities. Edinburgh-based personnel regularly deploy to Woomera to supplement the permanent detachment as operational tasking requires.

HOUSING AND ACCOMMODATION

Unlike other Defence bases, the housing at Woomera is not managed by Defence Housing Authority (DHA), rather all housing is managed by the Security and Estate Group (SEG). Although not to DHA standard, Defence houses are comfortable standard brick-veneer residences comprising:

- Three or four bedrooms
- Living/lounge with separate dining room
- Separate laundry
- · External entertainment area
- Single carport
- Garden shed
- New floor coverings
- Central reverse-cycle air conditioning/
- Solar hot water (with winter booster)
- Window furnishings

All Defence personnel posted to Woomera will be accommodated in Defence homes. SEG manages the allocation of homes for Defence personnel, taking into account family circumstances. The homes are of a smaller style and members can apply for storage of excess furniture and effects through their DHA Relocation Manager.

There is no Living-In-Accommodation or mess facility at RAAF Base Woomera, however the Eldo Hotel provides hotel-style accommodation. The Eldo Hotel is a commercial enterprise managed through Ventia and provides accommodation consisting of one- to three-bedroom units to both Defence and civilian personnel, including tourists and contractors.

Rent, electricity and water

As Woomera is a Defence establishment, there are no external service providers for electricity or water, and gas is not available. The tariffs for utility services to Defence homes are competitive and managed through Ventia. Defence personnel posted to Woomera are supported by remote-locality and remote-leave travel allowances

Telephone land lines, internet and mobile phones

Defence homes in Woomera have a telephone connection or can be installed on request. ADSL 2+ is available direct through Telstra or through their resellers. Optus services are not available by land line. It is recommended that you liaise with your service provider to confirm their mobile coverage offered in Woomera, however Telstra 4G network is available and provides the best coverage in and around Woomera.

Foxtel

Foxtel can be provided over ADSL 2+ through Telstra and may potentially be available via satellite. It is recommended you communicate directly with your preferred cable provider to determine availability. Foxtel dishes and connections are installed on the majority of Defence homes.

THE TOWNSHIP OF WOOMERA

RAAF Base Woomera is a remote location and the village (domestic area) has a permanent population of approximately 150 people, consisting of Defence (RAAF and APS), their families and civilian contractors. It is well serviced to support a comfortable life style.

Commercial venues

Ventia manages a range of facilities/services which operate within the village on a daily basis, including:

- The Eldo Hotel provides continental breakfasts and counter-meal-style dinners
- The Heritage Centre provides café-style breakfasts and lunches, a museum and bowling alley
- The Village Store provides basic grocery lines and alcohol
- Swimming pool, 25m
- Australia Post offers general post office services, stationery items and mail delivery.

Roxby Downs (76km north) and Port Augusta (175km south) are the nearest regional centres which offer a range of shopping outlets and services. Distance from WMA to the Adelaide CBD is 495km.

Pimba (6km south) is a small township known as 'Spuds Roadhouse' which is the nearest fuel



outlet and also offers roadhouse-style food and conveniences.

Community Offerings

RAAF Base Woomera presents a strong community spirit with all the social venues and services, including the Sports Club, RSL, cinema and Country Fire Services being run by volunteers. Individuals who volunteer their services to support these services can elect how much they become involved in community services and events. A chaplain from RAAF Base Edinburgh visits Woomera on a regular basis and a Skype service is available to communicate with a chaplain where immediate support is sought. During 2019, the Woomera Chapel was reopened. Services are held at the chapel by visiting chaplains from Roxby Downs.

Health

The Woomera Medical Services are delivered through a Joint Health Command-funded contract, with the service available to Defence and the general public. The service times vary with supplementation by external medical personnel during large tests and trials. Annual periodic health medical and dental appointments can be arranged at the RAAF Base Edinburgh Health Centre.

Emergency services

The Woomera Emergency Services is a contracted service managed through SEG and provides structural firefighting and ambulance service. Due to the remote location and limited medical and emergency support, it is recommended member's families have the appropriate ambulance cover to alleviate costly ambulance fees.



Sporting facilities

Woomera boasts two football ovals, a fitness centre, outdoor basketball and netball courts, squash courts and an outdoor swimming centre. The 6km of sealed roads which circumnavigate the village present an ideal running track amid the local wildlife, including kangaroos, emus, rabbits and wedgetail eagles.

Woomera Area School

Located in the Woomera Village, Woomera Area School is a South Australian Department for Education school catering for students from Foundation to Year 12, and has an integrated pre-school for Kindergarten students. The school aims to inspire students to be creative, curious, resilient lifelong learners.

The school values of respect, honesty and trust set the foundations for all students to appreciate diversity and support them to be active, informed citizens. The school focuses on STEAM (science, technology, engineering, the arts and maths) and students from all year levels have the opportunity to work with 3D printers, a laser cutter and in the kitchen garden. Senior students have access to a variety of VET options to provide them with opportunities to start their career paths while still at school.

The small Woomera community provides the



opportunity to consolidate learning in an engaging and supportive learning environment. The resources at the school are modern and extensive, catering to all areas of the curriculum and needs of the students. These include a large gymnasium, large classrooms with Interactive white boards, science laboratory, home-economics facility and a community library. Surrounded by desert and some of the richest mineral deposits in the world, we are able to use these attributes in our learning.

Living in Woomera is a unique opportunity for families to experience life in the outback while still having access to quality education. The connection between the school and our students' families is strong and continues to develop providing opportunities for parents to be involved in school activities.

A number of commercial hire vehicle operators are located in Roxby Downs and will deliver and collect vehicles to Woomera.





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


